

NEW-YORK, January 7.

The Liverpool Packet arrived this morning, failed the 15th November, from Liverpool.

She failed in company with a number of vessels for different parts of Europe, on the 12th November. In the afternoon of the same day, they experienced a most tremendous gale from the N. W. and was obliged to put back to repair. In this gale 13 vessels were wrecked, some of them full of passengers for Ireland and Scotland; and several hundred dead bodies were taken up that and the next day, having floated on shore. The ship Friendship from Norfolk for Liverpool, cut away her masts and drove ashore; some of her hands perished.

The ships Lydia and Portland failed for New-York, about the 1st November. The Netor, Commerce and Stockport had also failed.

The ship Success, Lewis, arrived at Liverpool, in four weeks from this port.

LONDON, November 10.

Preparations are in considerable forwardness for an expedition. whole success will be a deadly stroke to the power of, though at present inactive, Marine of the enemy.

The French government, we are informed, have caused it to be intimated to the Senate of Hamburg, that on receiving a contribution of 11 millions of livres, they will forgive the insult done them in the surrender of Napper Tandy and his associates. A less sum it was believed, would be accepted, and amity restored through the agency of citizen Rheinhard, the French minister for foreign affairs; who is represented as much attached to Hamburg, from having resided there and married the daughter of a physician named Rumarus, who still practices in that city.

The embargo ordered by the Executive Directory on all vessels bearing the Hamburg flag, had not excited much sensation at Hamburg; the event having long been expected, the Hamburg traders had time either to leave France, or to hoist the Danish flag, under which many of them have since left the ports of the Republic.

About an hundred letters from the Helder, brought thence by a passport, were yesterday delivered from the Post Office; they are dated two days subsequent to the mail, but do not contain any matter of moment. The troops were for the greater part embarked, and we are taught to expect their arrival in England as immediately as the wind will permit.

The troops remaining in Holland on the 3d inst. consisted of the 5th regiment, the 3d battalion of the 9th, the 31st, 56th, and 69th, besides Russians. There were more transports at the Helder than were necessary for their conveyance.

The Russian general Herman, on the 25th ult. continued at Lisse. He was much indisposed—he declined all society excepting that of his two adjutants.

The late accounts from Switzerland represent the army of Massena to have been for upwards of four months without pay, and nearly destitute of both cloaths and provisions.

The Dutch Democrats are stated to have been greatly indignant with General Brune for his convention with the English, conceiving that the relative situation of the two armies entitled the Republicans to even more favourable terms.

The new French army of the North is rapidly forming in Brabant; it is to consist of two divisions of 12,000 men each; the one to be encamped near Antwerp, the other on the Meuse. Bournoville had the inspection and organization of it.

Government, on Thursday, received dispatches from the Theatre of War on the continent. Their silence on the subject has induced a report that their contents were unfavourable; and some of our journals have insinuated, some disasters to the allies in Italy. We most sincerely hope the inference will prove unwarranted by fact.

We are happy in being able from the best authority to state, that the reports which have for some days past prevailed of a contagious fever having broken out at Lisbon, are wholly unfounded.

The Merchants of Liverpool have, with their accustomed wisdom and liberality, established a fund for the support of commercial credit in the present eventful period.

The West-India fleet is appointed to sail from Portsmouth on Thursday next. Several ships for America will take advantage of it.

We regret to learn, that a transport foundered on Seroby Sand on Wednesday night, when, it is added, 74 Artillery men, with their officers were drowned. The crew, consisting of 5 men, escaped.

Napper Tandy and his associates were yesterday removed from Newgate, to be conveyed to Ireland.

The total amount of failures which have taken place in Hamburg, from the 6th of September to the 25th October, is twenty-six millions seven hundred and fifty-three thousand seven hundred and fifty three Banco Marks.

The Duke of York, on landing at Yarmouth on Sunday, (attended by General Dundas, Colonel Brownrigg, and Sir H. Popham,) was met by Lord Duncan, in whose carriage his Royal Highness was conveyed to the house of the Noble Admiral, by the populace, who took away the horses and drew the coach. The Duke arrived in town at six o'clock on Monday morning, and shortly after set off for Windsor, where after a short stay with their Majesties, he proceeded to the Dutchess at Oatlands.

We are gratified to learn that the Marquis of Huntley is much recovered from his

wounds. He and the Hon. Colonels Forbes and Oswald, and Captain Gordon, landed at Leith on the 30th, from a sloop of war which conveyed them from Holland. Captain Gordon is likewise recovering.

The Hereditary Prince of Orange, it is said, is to have the command of the 6000 Dutch troops at the Isle of Wight.

The wounded troops at Colchester, amount to 900; accommodation has been provided for 1200 more.

The guards have arrived in town from Holland; from whence 7000 Russians put into Yarmouth on the 7th, in their way to Guernsey.

The Bank Directors are said to be in treaty with the Minister for the renewal of their charter, which has but a few years to run, and for which, it is added, they are required to pay four millions, being twice the amount paid on former occasions.

It is said that Mr. Pitt, having been informed that the brewers purposed to add a halfpenny to the price of each quart of porter, intimated, that in the event of their doing so, government would draw from the article an additional revenue.

The halfpenny per quart which the brewers purposed to add to the price of porter, is calculated to produce a revenue of 700,000l. per annum.

Count d'Artois, on arriving at his house in Welbeck street on the 3d, received, it is asserted, a message from high authority to return to Guilford.

An officer of high rank is said to have been committed to Newgate on a charge of treason.

Burn, the Covent Garden dancer, has returned from America, and is at present in Ireland.

The letters brought by the last Lisbon mail were delivered on Friday after being fumigated. It was reported that an infected cargo from the Mediterranean had been landed at Lisbon, and that symptoms of the plague had shewn themselves in that city. We hope and believe, as the letters make no mention of such a circumstance, that the report is unfounded.

It is said that Louis XVIII. will soon return to Germany.

The Hamburg papers throw the blame of allowing the seizure of Napper Tandy upon the King of Prussia who, as President of Lower Saxony, should have protected Hamburg.

The palace of the King of Reccan, on the coast of Ava, is said, amongst its unparalleled riches, to contain seven idols of gold as large as life, covered with diamonds of immense value.

It is said there have been but eighteen fine days in Germany since the commencement of the last spring.

On Monday last 37 female convicts were sent from Newgate on board the Speedy, at Long Reach, to be conveyed to Botany Bay.

The Hamburg mail received on Wednesday relates, that 300 Austrians were expected to have arrived at Ancona on the 31st of October, to take possession of the fortress, the French General refusing to deliver it to any other than regular troops.

From Alexandria, October 7, it is stated, that on the preceding day the Austrians obtained an important victory over the French, and opened the communication between Ceva and the camp before Coni, which place they had surrounded, and which they were immediately to besiege.

From Milan, of the 10th, it is said, Gen. Melas had defeated Gen. Championet with the loss of 4000 men. The head quarters of the latter were at Finale, and his army consisted of 40,000 strong.

Accounts from Vienna, Oct. 19, mention a number of recruits having been sent from thence by waggons to upper Italy, whither Gen. Froelich with his troops and 4000 Russians, had been ordered to proceed from Rome; from which city it is said, under the date of October 5, that the tree of liberty and tri-coloured cockade had been burned when the Neapolitan flag was hoisted at St. Angelo.

From Genoa, under date October 3, it is said General Klenau had repulsed the French to the walls of the city, and possessed himself of the heights upon which he was erecting batteries. General Championet had sent his sick and wounded to Nice. Many of the Genoese merchants had emigrated, in consequence of which their properties were confiscated. Want extended over those who remained, whose misery was increased by heavy contributions.

The body of the late Pope was deposited in the cellar of the house he had inhabited at Valence, from which his confessor and the prelates Spina and Caraccio were ordered not to depart. The French continued to resist all entreaties to permit the remains of the pontiff to be removed to Rome.

From Switzerland, October 17, it is said that General Massena had threatened to enforce the demand of contributions from Basle.

Accounts from Darmstadt, of the 22d and 23d October, relate that the French, on entering Manheim and Heidelberg, declared they would treat the Palatinate as a hostile country, and ordered in each considerable contributions. In Franconia the peasants were rising in a mass. It was reported that Gen. Sztarray had driven the French from Heidelberg.

From Frankfurt, Oct. 22, it is said the French had attacked the peasants and troops of Mentz, by whom, however, they had been defeated.

From the Mayn, Oct. 22, it is related that 18,000 French purposed to attack, and winter in the Dutchy of Wirtemberg; to prevent which the peasants were arming, whilst the Austrians joined in preparations to repel the enemy. Gen. Hohenloe was on the 18th within 6 miles of Heilbronn,

with 6000 men; and general Sztarray was advancing from Carlsruhe.

A treaty of peace, commerce, fishery and navigation, has been concluded between his catholic majesty and the emperor of Morocco at Mequing.

Arrived, at Torbay on the 2d Nov. Lord Bridport, with 27 sail of the line.

Importation and price of Wheat.

We feel considerable pleasure in stating, that large quantities of foreign wheat have been imported into this country during the last week, and we have reason to believe that the supply will be continued and extensive. At Bridlington, Wells, Lynn, Ipswich, &c. &c. the importation has amounted to several thousand quarters. In the port of London, within the space of five days, it was as under:—From Dantzic, 16,339 quarters; Pillan, 3,599; Elbing, 1,570; Stralsund, 1012; Embden, 1387.

Price of grain in Leicester market:—Wheat 3l. 10s. to 3l. 10s. per quarter; Barley 2l. 7s. to 2l. 17s. Oats 1l. 15s. to 2l. 2s. Beans 3l. 4s. to 4l. The influx of Wheat has considerably reduced its price. Barley, Oats, and Beans continue dear.

From the Observer, dated Sunday, Nov. 10.

"Distinguished merit, in whomever it may be found, always meets our ready commendation. The following detail affords us particular pleasure, as, in doing justice to some gallant fellows, it records an act highly honorable to a people whom we wish to again and forever esteem as a second part of ourselves.

"At ten o'clock on the morning of the 28th ult. Seilly N. N. E. distance 35 leagues, the ship Washington, from London for Philadelphia, J. Williamson, commander, was attacked by a French privateer, with 25 guns on her gun-deck, and 4 on her quarter-deck, when a close action commenced, in which the Washington's 24 cannonades up, and she was left to depend on 8 twelve pounders; she, however, made good use of her guns, that at eleven o'clock the privateer made fail to repair her damage, the Washington being too much cut in her rigging to be able to follow.

"At twelve the again bore down, and at half past one renewed the fight, which was continued with great warmth for an hour and a quarter, when the ran with all the sail she could carry, leaving the Washington's braces, tail-sheets, standing and running rigging, and all sails cut to pieces; her three masts and crotchets rendered useless, and the entire ship a mere wreck; but fortunately with only one man killed, and two wounded.

"The intelligence was brought by a Swede from Smyrna, which adds, that the wind being too far to the northward to fetch even Ireland, captain Williamson proposed to stand for Lisbon, where we trust he has safely arrived with his gallant shipmates."

The Columbia, Harvey, from London to New-York, is amongst the vessels which have been taken by the French off Dungeness, and carried into Calais.
