## Foreign Intelligence.

#### LONDON, December 13.

The Hamburg mail, due on Wednefday,

arrived this morning. The Ruffians, have begun their march homeward. On the 25th ult, the headquarters of Suwarrow were removed from Augsburg to Eiratsburg, in Bavaria, a dif-tance of about eighteen miles. The Ruf-fians crofs the Lech daily, in divisions of nans crois the Leen daily, in divisions of 4000 each. The whole army, upon its ar-rival in Bavaria, will be divided into two columns, one of which is to take its route through Bohemia to Cracow, the other is to proceed through Moravia to Gailicia. We fee lefs and lefs reafon for fuppoling that the differences between the Imperial courts will be adjuffed, or that the orders for the return of the Ruffians will be coun-

In Italy, the Auftrians purfue their ca-reer with unvarying fuccefs. After the bat-tle of Genoa on the 4th ult. the French army divided into two columns; one under general Victor took a position near Mondo-vi. From that position it was driven with the loss of Mondovi, and forced to withdraw to Safona and Finale. The fecond column under Grenier was also forced to abandon the post of Borgo St. Dalmazzo, and to retreat to Robilante. When the official accounts came away, the Auffrians were ftill in purfuit of the French. Gen. Bellegarde was on the 15th at Bognasco, from whence he proceeded to Riviera. Coni is vigoroufly befieged, and as Lemone and Ormea are taken, the fiege can be carried on without interruption. An unofficial article mentions the capture of the Col di Tenda, of which our readers have been already informed from bur readers have been already informed from the Paris papers. It is added that the French have been driven from the vallies of the Moira, and that the Aultrians have ad-vanced beyond the frontiers. Gen. Melas is to be ftrongly reinforced. THE parable, of which my text is a part, prefents, that a certain man had two lons. The younger, probably impelled by that youthful ardor for independence, which often involves in endle's perplexity, demanded and obtained his portion of the inheritance. Caught by the falcinating glare of diffipapation, his fubftance is fpeedily exhaulted in " riotous living," and he becomes a comfort-lefs victim of this ruinous feduction. A famine, pervades the land ; and, in the univerfal diffrels, this friendlefs being is marked as a more than ordinary fufferer. He feeks to preferve life by a participation with the grovelling herd ; and, in this deep humiliation, he looks back with agony upon the luxuries of former time, and reflects with eny upon the comforts of the fervants of his father's houshold. The hour of diffrefs and the hour of penitence are not infrequently the fame. The prodigal refolves to arife and go to his father, there acknowledge his folly and transgreffion, and ask of him, as a boon, that he may be made as one of his hired fervants. At his return, the father receives nim, neither with phlegmatic reproof, nor philosophic coldness, but with the ardency of a parent, exulting in the falvation of a fallen fon. In the eeftafy of the fcene, he commands, that " the best robe be brought and put upon him, and that a ring be put upon his hand and fhoes upon his feet." His orders are alfo given, that the fatted ; calf be killed, and that the reftoration of his " loft fon" be celebrated by feftal merriment throughout his houshold.

The joy of this interefting fcene is marred by an unpleafant incident. The elder fon returns from the field; and, hearing the mufic and the dancing, enquires, with all the fullenness of jealousy, " what mean these things? He is told, that, in confequence of the return of his brother, mirth pervades the manfion. He is angry, and refufes to join in the general joy. When enhim of blind partiality for the prodigal .---" Lo, these many years do I ferve thee, neither transgreffed I at any time thy commandment, and yet thou never gaveft me a kid, that I might make merry with my friends; but as foon as this thy fon was come, which hath devoured thy living with harlots, thou hast killed for him the fatted calf." To the afperity of this acculation, the father replies in terms becoming a father, -" Thou art ever with me, and all that I have is thine ; it was meet, that we should make merry and be glad ; for this thy brother was dead and is alive again, and was loft The diffrefs and penitence of a youthful profligate, who had wasted his inheritance in the mazes of delufive pleafure ; the forgiving tendernels and undiffembled ceftacy of a parent, upon the recovery of a favorite child. " as a brand plucked out of the burning ;" and the churlifhuefs of a brother, jealous of parental favor, are firikingly depicted in A SECOND Dividend of the Effate of George this fimple fable. An unfortunate victim of vicious indulgence, funk to the loweft the committion, at any time when called for, at paternal manfion and the paths of virtue, is an unufual, but an interesting, exhibition. The cup of pleafure contains a draught, which is wont to flupify the nobler faculties of the foul. Reformation is a bufinefs of magnitude, which requires more feeling, worth and virtue, than ufu lly remain to the degraded and corrupted victims of fenfuality. the fwine and affociate with the brute crea-

not one inflinctive impulse to deeds of poli. ive virtue. When urged by his father, to articipate in the merriment of this pleafing eccafion, he recounts, in Pharifaic flyle, his own deeds and worth, fordidly taunts his father with difplaying faperior affection for the prodigal, and fullenly refufes to tune his foul to the joyous mufic and to mingle in the mazy dance.

The man, who can check the firong curent of the paffions, who can relift the allurements of the Syrens who invite to vice, and who, from the lowlinefs of moral abafement, ean reascend the heights of virtue, is marked by the pofferfion of a foul nearly allied to greatnefs. But he who puts forth the friendiv hand, to lead the wayward back to goodnefs, who nourifles with genial warmth reviving virtue, and who firives to reinflate the prodigal in priftine fame in excellence, is greatnefs felf, arrayed in brightest lustre.
