

TUESDAY, February 11.

Mr. Tallaterra presented a memorial of the officers of the Fifth Militia Dragoons, of the State of Georgia, in the service of the United States in the year '93-'94, under the order of Gov. Tallaterra; praying compensation therefor. Referred to the Secretary of War.

Mr. Claiborne presented a petition of Samuel Lewis, sen. stating that he was a clerk in the War Office for six years last past, and acted as money agent for that department; that on settlement of his account, a balance had been found due the United States, for which he had been arrested and was now imprisoned in the common goal of the city of Philadelphia; and praying to be liberated on condition of his applying part of the proceeds of his future labours to the payment of said balance, until the whole shall be liquidated. Referred to the Secretary of War.

Mr. Smith, from the committee of commerce and manufactures, pursuant to the order of the house of yesterday, reported a bill extending the time for the payment of bonds given for duties on imports, in certain cases; which was read a first and second time, and committed for to-morrow.

Mr. Gordon, from the select committee to whom were referred the consideration of that part of the law relative to the Military establishment which provides that non-commissioned officers or privates shall not be arrested for debt; reported a bill in addition to the laws relative to the Military establishment of the United States which was read a first and second time, and committed for to-morrow.

Mr. Thatcher, from the committee appointed on the subject of post-offices and post-roads, asked and obtained leave to report by bill or otherwise.

Mr. Smith, from the committee of Commerce and Manufactures, to whom were referred the consideration of the amendments to the bill providing for salvage in case of recapture, made a report, which was read, and committed to a committee of the whole house on Thursday.

On motion of Mr. Griswold, the petition of Thomas Armat, heretofore presented, and the papers accompanying it, was referred to the committee of commerce and manufactures.

Mr. D. Foster, from the committee of claims, made a report on the petition of Thomas Mear, who had bought a certificate, which, being of no value, he prayed congress would pay; the committee report as their opinion, he should abide the consequences of his own speculations; and that the prayer of the petitioner ought not to be granted.

Mr. F. also made a report on the petition of Savannah Fowler, praying for some provision to be made for her in consideration of the loss of her husband, who died in public service; the committee are of opinion, that the provision heretofore made by law for widows and orphans, has been liberal and that it would not be expedient to extend the principles which have been adopted in such cases—and that the petitioner should have leave to withdraw her petition.

Mr. F. also made two other reports on the petitions of John Stotefury and David Cook, praying for pensions, which the committee reported could not be granted, consistently with the principles which have been heretofore adopted and sanctioned by the house.

Mr. F. also made another report on the petition of Jacob Herman, who said he was taken prisoner in the year 1776, and that he entered the British service, from which he retired to Pennsylvania more than 20 years since—supposing some wages was due to him when he was taken prisoner, he now, for the first time solicits payment—the committee report it as their opinion, that the request is unreasonable, and that the petition ought to be rejected.

These reports were severally read a first and second time, and concurred in by the house.

A message was received from the Senate, by Mr. Otis, their secretary, informing the House that the Senate had passed the bill giving further time to the holders of military land warrants, to register and locate the same, without amendment.

The order of the day to take into consideration the report of the committee of the whole House, on the bankrupt bill, having been called for by Mr. Bayard, after proposing and agreeing to several amendments.

Mr. Jones, agreeable to the notice which he had given, moved the following additional section:

"And be it further enacted, That nothing in this act contained, shall extend to, or in any wise affect or operate upon debts contracted or transactions which may have taken place prior to the passing thereof."

This motion was opposed by Messrs. Bayard and Marshall; and finally negatived, only 24 members voting in the affirmative.

Mr. Mason moved to strike out the 24th section, which gives the commissioners power to examine the wife of a bankrupt upon oath—which created considerable debate. Upon the question there were ayes 38—noes 49.

The bill was then ordered to be engrossed for a third reading on Monday next—55 members voting in favor of it.

Mr. Smith from the committee of commerce and manufactures, to whom were referred the memorial of a number of mer-

chants of the city of Philadelphia, relative to the 75th section of the act to regulate the collection of duties on imports and tonnage, reported a bill to allow a drawback of duties on goods exported to New Orleans, and therein to amend the act intitled "An act to regulate the collection of duties on imports and tonnage"—which was read a first and second time, and committed to a committee of the whole house.

Adjourned.

Port of Philadelphia.

Captain Taylor, of the schoner Friendship, informs that he failed from Gonaves the 1st January, in company with the schoner Nancy, Nash, of and for Boston. Next fell in with and joined a fleet under convoy of the Herald sloop of war; among them were the brig ——, from Port de Paix for Salem; schoner ——, for Boston, and sloop Little Gem, of Philadelphia, bound to New York. Parted from the convoy in the Caicos passage on the 10th January. February 1st, in lat. 34, 00, long. 72, 0, spoke the above sloop, all well. Left Reedy Island on Monday, when the schoner ——, from Richmond, and sloop ——, from North Carolina, were the only new arrivals.

Captain Waite, of the ship Nestor, arrived in town yesterday, left Reedy Island on Monday, and informs that he failed from Liverpool the 27th October in consequence of heavy gales of wind he put into Belfast the 1st November sailed from thence the 3d in co. with brig Randall, Bofworth, of and for Kennebunk, which had on board Capt. Hathway, and crew of the brig Polly, of Kennebunk, which vessel, some time before, had been wrecked on the north side of the island. By stormy weather, were again obliged to seek shelter, and fortunately made the port of Kinsale the 15th Nov. Same day, came into the same port, the ship Amiable, Tillinghaft, of and for Philadelphia, from Hamburg, and ship Jefferson, Freeman, of and for Boston, from Liverpool; the latter vessel was in a very distressed condition, rudder and top-mast carried away, and altogether greatly injured.

Left Kinsale the 25th November in co. with the ship Amiable, Tillinghaft, parted from her the 29th in lat. 49, N. long. 29. In lat. 25, long. 55, spoke the schooner Swallow, Wren, from Halifax for Barbadoes, all well. In lat. 30, 0, N. long. 72, spoke the brig Heppy, of Hartford, from Savannah, bound to Barbadoes, out four days. February 2, at 8 A. M. Captain Henry, bearing W. by S. dist. 79 miles, saw a ship to windward, which have out colours and bore down; at 11, A. M. proved to be the ship New York, Colly, of and from Peterburg to London, who kindly offered us any assistance we might stand in need of. Same day at 8 M. spoke the ship Barbary, ——, of and from Baltimore, bound to Cadiz, who obligingly supplied us with stores.

Ship Factor, Kemp, sails from N York on Tuesday next for London, also two other vessels, by which letters may be forwarded to England, sail on Sunday next.

The Galliot, Iris, from hence to Bremen, has put into Ramsgate.

Brig Maria, ——, from hence has arrived at Hamburg.

Galliot Christ ana Doretha, ——, from hence to Hamburg, has put into Weymouth.

Jan. 22, lat. 28, 30, long. 67, 25, spoke schooner Bellifarius, M'Heron, from N. York bound to Cape Francois, out 8 days all well.

Feb. 3, spoke a brig from Wilmington, N. C. bound to London, had sprung a leak and intended to make the first port, in all probability Norfolk.

Yesterday arrived the ship Polanbee, captain Ward, from Hamburg, which place he left Dec. 31, in company with nearly 30 sail, among which were Capts. Archer and Upton, for Salem. and Capt. Philips, of Salem, for India. Jan. 1, spoke brig Eliza, from New-York for the coast of Africa. 4th, spoke brig Sally, of N. York, bound to Liverpool. 14th, spoke Capt. Merrill, in a ship belong to Haverhill, from Norfolk, for Liverpool. 16th, spoke a ship from Portland for Liverpool: the night before the vessel had been struck with lightning, and the second mate and one man so badly hurt, that their lives were despaired of.
