TARIFF RESOLUTIONS. The following preamble and resolution were introduced into the State Senate by Mr. SANDERSON.

WHEREAS, the Tariff of 1842 is a just and salutary national measure, which yields an ample revenue to defray the necessary expenses of the General Government, while it at the same time encourages agricultural pursuits, by creating a firm and staple Home Market—revives commercial enterprise, by extending internal trade, and affording articles for export—gives employment to our own citizens, instead of maintaining the subjects of foreign governments—tends to increase the wages of labor, by creating a demand for it—preserves public morals, by substituting industry for idleness—and protects American labor against foreign policy and legislation.

The Cherokees. It is stated that nearly five hundred "refugees" from the Cherokee nation are receiving rations near Evansville, Arkansas, under a contract, by virtue of authority from Gen. Arbutck. Companies D and G of the United States Dragoons, arrived at Fort Gibson from Washita, but they were immediately ordered to Evansville, and proceeded thence. Col. McKissick, the Cherokee agent, has called upon Gen. Arbutck for a company of dragoons to be stationed at Beattie's Pri-
