

ARMY COURT MARTIAL. A Court Martial is now sitting in Washington City, to investigate certain charges preferred against Lieut. Col. Fremont, of the U. S. Regiment of Mounted Riflemen. The Colonel is charged with Mutiny and Disobedience of orders, whilst in California, he having refused to recognize the authority of Gen. Kearney, a superior officer.

The testimony already adduced on the trial is voluminous, and it is supposed that by the time it is got through with, the chief purpose of the Administration in bringing on the war will be pretty fully developed.

GENERAL TAYLOR.—The Atlanta Miscellany of the 23d ult. says: "We conversed on Thursday last with a gentleman who has been for some time attached to the Quartermaster's Department in Gen. Taylor's division, and who left the Rio Grande on the 6th inst. He informed us that the statement contained in the papers that the General would visit this country in the month of November is without foundation.

IMPORTANT ARREST. We learn from the Germantown Telegraph of the 3d inst., that a man, who gave his name as Shakespeare, was arrested, in Philadelphia, having in his possession nearly \$5000 in counterfeit 10's, on the Mechanics' Bank of the city of New York.

Judge BANKS has issued a circular to the Commissioners and Treasurers of the several counties, urging the prompt collection and payment of taxes, to meet the February interest. The damage done by the late flood will diminish the receipts of the Treasury to a very considerable amount.

Shunk's majority for Governor is 17,976, and Longstreth's majority for Canal Commissioner 17,718. Gen. Irvin's vote falls short of Gen. Markle's in 1844, about 28,000, and Shunk's is about 14,000 short of his former vote.

THE MARKETS. In Baltimore, flour is selling at 80. More sellers than buyers. Wheat, 1.25. New York—Prices unsettled. Small sales of flour a \$6.37; of wheat, at 1.45.

The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, now in session at Pittsburgh, have decided the "No license Law" of this State to be unconstitutional.

One thousand laborers are wanted upon the Public works immediately, to repair the damage occasioned by the recent freshets.

The Public is reminded by the New York "Express" that in the Congress which is to assemble on the 6th of the next month every member of the House of Representatives has been chosen by SINGLE DISTRICTS, for the first time we believe, since the organization of the National Government in 1789.

The Journal printed at Camden, (S. C.) states that it is in contemplation to raise a fund sufficient to support the family of the late Col. P. M. Butler in honorable competency, by a general subscription of the citizens of South Carolina.

The Hon. Jabez W. Huntington, the only Whig United States Senator from Connecticut, died at his residence in Norwich, on Monday evening, Nov. 1st, of a bilious attack.

The Philadelphia papers state that Mr. George Plitt, of Western Pennsylvania, was robbed in the National Theatre in that city, of his pocket book containing \$4,700 in bank notes.
