New York, August 28.—The steamship New York, from Southampton on the 17th instant, arrived this morning.

The Times expresses astonishment at the manner in which the Federal bonds are absorbed at Frankfurt, adding that such excessive fall is recorded by the existing bondholders.

The Times believes that the campaign in America will continue, unless the danger in Washington is so great as to demand the return of the main body of Grant's army.

The Confederate loan advanced 3 per cent on the basis of Grant's repulse before Petersburg, the quotation being 77 1/2.

A further diminution of specie to the extent of four millions of francs from the Bank of France, has been announced.

The Prussian Government has prohibited the export from Jutland of cattle and grain during the armistice.

The Prussian Government is proposing the following to the German Diet—That an explanation be demanded of Austria and Prussia with reference to their having permitted the King of Denmark to cede the province of Schleswig to Prussia.

The frigate Niagara had sailed from London. Her destination was unknown.

Eighty-one Italian steamers anchored off Foyers, Ireland, on the 13th, and sailed again in the evening. She is supposed to be a blockade runner.

The private Steamer destroyed the ship Esperanza, which was bound for New York to California. She took \$70,000 from her.

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ARMY OF POTOMAC.

FURTHER PARTICULARS OF THURSDAY'S FIGHT.

WASHINGTON, August 28.—A letter received from the Army of the Potomac, dated August 28, says all was quiet, excepting the usual picketing in front of the 9th Corps. The firing on our right on Thursday was occasioned by a movement of outposts from one position to another, which the enemy evidently did not mind.

Our total loss in the fight of Thursday, will not, it is said, exceed two thousand, while that of the enemy is supposed to be about five thousand. We still hold about four miles of the Weldon railroad, and the portion abandoned by the 21st Corps was ultimately destroyed.

Deserters who came in yesterday, say that General A. P. Hill's Corps, two divisions of Longstreet's Corps, and the Jeff. Davis Legion, were the Rebel troops engaged on Thursday.

It also states that since the Weldon railroad fell into our possession, pork has advanced six and beef to eight dollars a pound in Richmond, and their officers declare that the road must be recaptured at all hazards.

General Sherman is without any material change, 34 was held for Schuyler's Navigation company, and 40 for preferred.

The Stock Market continues easy at about former rates. Bond and Field sold at 72 1/2 was bid for Chesnut and Walnut, and 34 for Green and Catox.

Bank Shares continue firm, but there is little or nothing doing in the way of sales; 61 1/2 was bid for Farmers and Mechanics; 59 for Commercial; 28 1/2 for Merchants; 70 for Tobacco; and 34 for Commonwealth.

The Money Market continues easy at former rates; loans are plenty on call at 6 per cent; premium gold paper is selling at from 76 1/2 per cent.

A despatch from Washington this morning says: "The subscriptions to the new 7-30 loan reported at the Treasury Department Saturday morning, had reached 10 per cent, since Saturday morning. There is more activity in the market, and the new issue is making—opening at 24 1/2; fall off and sold at 24 1/2 at 10 o'clock; 24 1/2 at 12, and 24 1/2 at 3.
