THE BATTLE BEFORE PETERSBURG. There have been three short but sharp contests on the line of the Weldon railroad since the enemy advanced their line to that direction on Thursday last. They took place respectively on Thursday, Friday, and Sunday. In these three battles a Petersburg paper estimates the enemy's loss, including prisoners, at not less than eight thousand, probably more.

Up to yesterday the enemy maintained their position on the line of the railroad, and were still engaged in fortifying and strengthening their position, showing no disposition to depart.
