MONDAY, OCTOBER 17, 1864. DAVIS RESPONDS. Nothing but some great, urgent necessity could have induced Mr. Jefferson Davis to make his late tour through the South.

The truth would seem to be that the people of the South are fast getting tired of the war. It has been to them a great calamity, unrelieved or mitigated by a single benefit or consolation.

These conditions, however, are rapidly changing in our favor, and the Southern people begin to perceive and recognize the fact. Within the last few months a great change has come over the spirit of their dream.

But Georgia is not likely to be deluded much longer by such expectations. The real experiences of nearly four years of strife, resulting only in disappointment and disaster, are more powerful arguments than the visionary promises of the Rebel leaders.

Their present disposition must be great, indeed, to compel Davis to make so earnest an effort to prevent the unseparated mutiny. He knows the hands shrouded on which the Rebellion now hangs suspended, and he knows, too, how fatal to all his hopes would be the giving way of a single one of the States allied in this stupendous conspiracy against the peace and unity of the nation.

NO WONDER, THEN, THAT HE LEAVES HIS CAPITAL AND GOES AMONG THE PEOPLE OF THE SOUTHWEST, SEECHING THEM, IN ANXIOUS, IMPLORING ACCENTS, TO KEEP UP THEIR COURAGE, PREPARE FOR GREAT SACRIFICES, AND RESOLUTELY STAND BY HIM TO THE TERRIBLE ENTERPRISE IN WHICH HE AND OTHER ARCH-CONTRIVERS OF THE REBELLION CRUELLY INVOLVED THEM AND THE WHOLE SOUTH.
