PENNSYLVANIA.

THE BRITISH APPEAL FOR PEACE—MORE IMPERTINENCE.

So far as respects the positive complicity of the British Government and the British people in the prosecution of the war against us, on the high seas, they have deferred the reckoning till they can give it their special attention.
