That the numerous party which opposed the re-election of Mr. LINCOLN, and expressed confidence in their power to prevent it, feel profoundly the utter failure of all their efforts to the contrary. But if they were actuated in their desire and labors for a change in the National Administration by an honest sentiment of patriotism and devotion to the laws, they will bear their disappointment with decorous resignation to the verdict of the majority; and instead of indulging in any unbecoming manifestations of dissatisfaction with that verdict, they will not only yield a loyal submission to it, but turn in with all the past and present friends of the Government, and lend them a hearty co-operation in the great and important work of subduing the rebellion and re-establishing the Union.

It would tend, above all things, to prove that the differences of views with regard to the questions of administrative policy that have heretofore divided the Republicans and Democrats were conscientiously entertained by the letter, and that their opposition to the measures and recommendations of the President was not, in fact, or essentially, hostility to the Government itself; and it would, moreover, have a powerful influence in effecting that complete and cordial union of all persons in the loyal States in support of the national authority which has hitherto been so much desired, and which, if once really and sincerely accomplished, would supply the only condition that has been and is as yet needed to render the Government invincible against rebellion, and secure it a speedy and thorough triumph over the enemies of the nation.
