NOVELTY IN ALE BREWING .- The ale brewers have interested themselves in experiments as to a method of saving and condensing all the aroma of the hop. Of this they now lose a great deal, and as hops are an item, whatever confines to the liquor all the virtues of the hop is greatly to be desired. The Philadelphia brewers have succeeded in perfecting an apparatus, space for which was made in their brewery by Messrs, Frederick and William Gaul. Having proved of great value, it will be generally adopted, and to some extent may revolutionize the process of brewing. The apparatus is a miniature brewery in itself, as this and the mash-tub are all that are required. The browers of the association out of the city have paid a visit to the brewery and witnessed its operation. Its value is shown to the expert in the absence of all the odor of hops that saturates the air surrounding any brewery, when the liquor is bolting. The odor is not unpleasant, but money is

The coal must be of the best Buck Mountain or Elack licath, or of a kind equal to them in all respects, for the purpose infended, which equality will be determined by a Board appointed by the Secretary of the Navy after the reception of the bids.

The name of the coal proposed to be furnished must be stated in the offer.

It is to be delivered in lumps of suitable size for naval steamers, clean, of uniform quanty, selected free from impurities, unnixed, of which the contractor will be required to turnish such evidence as will be satisfactory, and be subject to such inspec-

will be satisfactory, and be subject to such inspec-tion as to quality and quantity as the Department may direct. The coal must, in all respects, be satis-lactory to the inspector or inspectors to be appointed by the bureau, who will have the right of peremptory

The coal is to be delivered on board vessels, at such place in the port of New York as may be designated by the Bureau, and in such quantities and at such times as, in the opinion of the Bureau, the exigencies of the service may require; commencing when the versel is reported ready to receive cargo; furnishing, if demanded not sees than 1000 tons per day, to be distributed to each vessel, as may be directed, until the loading is completed.

In the case of failure to deliver the coal in proper quantits, of the proper quality, and at the proper time and place, the Bureau will reserve in the contract the right to purchase forthwith, at the contractor's risk and expense, that which may seem necessary to supply the deficiency.
