TEMPERANCE MEMORIAL.—A memorial was presented to Mayor McMichael ye "rday relative to the sale of liquor in the city of Philadelphia:"The memorialists urge that the task of sup-

pressing, as far as law can suppress, that traffic is much easier now than when Robert T. Conrad did almost entirely suppress it, by reason of the fact that the Sunday law of the 26th of Feb-ruary, 1855, was not enacted when he first became Mayor. Now the mode of proceeding is easier, the penalty more severe, the crime of selling or giving lequor is distinctly pointed out; and your memorialists believe that, if the Mayor is determined to compel diligence on the part of his officers, the drinking of spirituous or male liquors, wine, or cider, on Sunday, can be so far diminished that the day of rest will become what an overwhelming majority of the citizens desire it should be-a day for the case of creation, unpolluted by the disorders and crimes which now

The Mayor replied:-- "Gentlemen:-I take pleasure in receiving you upon such a mission. I have not received many communications upon this subject. I assure you I will do all I can consistently to aid the cause of temperance in this city. I will give your memorial an early and careful attention."

NEW HALL FOR THE CHAMBER OF COM-MERCE.—The Corn Exchange of this city, the most vigorous of all our commercial institutions, is about to have a new building provided for it, in much the same way that the Union League House was built; that is, not by the Association itself, but by a corporation formed out of a number of its members, with the understanding that the edilice is to be rented by the Association when finished. In point of fact, the Corn Exchange itself has no surplus fund for the pur-pose, although the contributions of the mempers exceed the regular expenses. The property purchased is on the east side of South Second street, above Walnut, and the new structure will be one hundred teet front by one hundred and fifty feet deep. The architect John Crump was the designer and builder of the League House. The Corn Exchange will drop its name when it enters this new shell, and henceforth be denominated the Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, a much more appropriate title, as it now includes wide range of business not expressed by its old name.

Mozart on Fugues.

In the "Letters of Mozart," recently published by Hurd & Houghton, we find his views of fugues and fugue-playing. He writes to a friend in relation to one of his compositions of this

"My dear wife Constanze is, in fact, the origin of this fugue coming into the world. Baron von Swieten, to whom I go every Sunday, gives me all Handel's and Sebastian Bach's fugues (after I have played them to him) to take home with me. When Consumze heard these, she fell in love with them at once; she will listen to nothing but (ugues, and particularly the works (in this style) of Handel and Bach. As she had often heard me play fugues out of my head, she asked me it I never wrote them down; and when sala I never did, she reproached me for not having composed this most artistic and beauti-tal style of music, and never ceased her entreaties till I wrote a logue for her. So this is its origin. I have purposely timed it andante maescoso, that it may not be played too quick; for if a fugue is not rather slowly played, the subject as it comes in cannot be distinctly and clearly heard, and thus naturally produces no effect. In the course of time, and when I have a tavorable opportunity, I intend to write five others, and present them to Baron von Swieten, whose col-lection of music, though small in numbers, is great in value. So on this account I beg you to adhere to your promise, not to show it to a soul. Learn it by heart and play it. A fugue is not easily caught by another person from merely hearing it."

-The ochre works of E. & F. King & Co., dealers in paints, oils, and dye stuffs, at Nos. 20 and 27 India street, Boston, were destroyed by fire on Friday night last, 5th instant. The building was of wood, of considerable size, and two stories in height, and contained valuable machinery, raw material, and manufactured stock. The loss is estimated at about \$15,000, which is partially covered by insurance.

-A woman was frozen to death in Syracuse on Sunday night. The particulars are as follows:—Mrs. Thompson, who resides alone, is subject to fits and also addicted to drinking, and was intoxicated when last seen on Sunday evening. It is supposed that she must have been taken in a fit while in the pantry; for not making her appearance as usual, inquiry was made for her whereabouts, and on entering her house, she was found lying on the floor of the pantry, frozen stiff.

-A most flendish murder was committed at Corner's Creek, about five miles from Detroit, on Friday last. A man named John Cooper visited the house of his sister, Mrs. Lynch, and after remaining there for some time, drew a re-volver from his pocket and deliberately fired at er, but missed his mark. He then seized an axe and made a brutal attack upon her, telling er to the floor, and then commenced cutling or body in a most hornble manner. While he was perpetrating this atrocious deed, a little son Mis. Lynch informed some workmen in the icinity of the act. who immediately rushed to he house, seized the murderer, and brought him o jall in Detroit. He admits that he intended o kill her, and says that she murdered his father some years ago in Ireland, and he committed the deed to avenge his death.
