HOME FOR AGED COLORED PEOPLE. The annual meeting of the contributors to the Home for Aged Colored Females was held last evening in Sansom Street Hall, President Dilwyn Parrish in the chair.

Next spring, however, the managers intend to erect a new building on a large lot which belongs to the institution, situated on the east side of Twenty-second street, above Locust. For this purpose they have a fund of \$19,000, which is reserved exclusively for building purposes.
