Mrs. Boas nearly

suffocated in the second-stery rooms. The loss is not much to either party.

About a quarter past 2 P. M., yesterday, Odd Fellows' Hall, on Sixth street, below Race, made a singular escape from destruction by fire. The lower part of the building is occupied as stores.
No. 146 N. Sixth street, corner of Haines, is occupied by Mr. William Curtis, Grand Secretary of the Order, as a store for the sale of regalia. In his office, at the rear of the store the fire began. A range of closets had been built against the flue. They were filled with papers. The heat in the flue had set fire to the contents of the closet. The janutor was told of the fire by some boys in the street who saw the smoke. The firemen came promptly, but their services were unnecessary.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ANNIVERSARY .- The thirtieth anniversary of the Sunday Schools of Emanuel Episcopal Church, Marlborough street, above Girard avenue, was held in the church yesterday afternoon. A large number of persons were in attendance, many being unable to gain admittance. The report of the Superintendent, Mr. Joseph Christian, was read, and exhibited the following facts:-The total amount of missionary offerings collected during the year amounted to \$337.51; the number of female scholars attending the main school is 180; number of males attending the same, 146; making a total of 326. Ninety-one scholars were admitted during the year, and seventy-live were either transferred to other schools or left. The infant schools are attended by 175 children. Two hundred new books were added to the library during the past year, and it contains at the present time

upwards of 900 volumes.

LADIES' CENTENARY ASSOCIATION .- A society called the American Methodist Ladies' Centenary Association has been organized for the purpose of co-operating with and aiding the Central Centenary Committee of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the accomplishment beneficent designs. The funds of this Association, after paying current expenses, will be appropriated to the Garrett Biblical Institute, at Evanston, Illinois, for the purpose of erecting a dormitory hall or home for students while pursuing their theological course; and to the Metho-dist General Biblical institute, at Concord, to be removed to the vicinity of Boston, in equal sums, until each shall have received fifty thousand dollars, after which all contributions shall be paid to the Connectional Centenary Educational Fund.

DEDICATION OF BRAINERD MISSION SCHOOL.—The dedication of Brainerd Mission School building, Greenwich street, east of Moyamensing avenue, took place yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The building is a neat, unpretend-ing brick structure, and will accommodate about five hundred. The interior contains on the walls a variety of maxims of a sacred character, such as "God is Love," "Feed my Lambs," etc. At the appointed time of dedication the house was thronged to overflowing, the scholars of the Sunday School occupying a place in the body of the edifice. Adoresses were made by Rev. Dr. Brainerd, Rev. John McLeod, Rev. Wolcott Calkins, and by other pastors of the Philadel-

The affair concluded with a champagne supper, after which the assembly was neatly addressed by Colonel A. K. Zeilan.

POLICE STATISTICS.—During the year 1865, 39,515 persons were arrested by the city police, natives of the following countries:— United States, 15,611; Ireland, 19,141; Germany, 2504; England, 1585; Scotland, 273; France, 100; Canada, 20; Italy, 32; Poland, 4; Spain, 12; Wales, 9; Denmark, 2; West Indies, 12; Sweden, 3; Norway, 7. The nativities of the 36,828 lodgers in the police stations were as 10llows:— Ireland, 21,209; United States, 11,051; Germany, 2884; England, 1248; Scotland, 259; Wales, 10; France, 118; Spain, 12; Italy, 8; Canada, 19; West Indies, 6; Holland, 3; China, 1.

THE CHANGEABLE WEATHER.-Saturday was a balmy, spring-like day; the weather was delightful, marred only by the dampness which pervaded pavements and thoroughfares. Overcoats were uncomfortable, and ladies promenaded without their furs. Yesterday, a cold, cutting wind prevailed, and fleecy clouds were driven to the southeast by the northern blasts. There was a difference of ten degrees between Saturday and Sunday, at noon. To-day we are having another "blue" Monday. The thermometer is ten degrees above zero, and there is very little gossiping at street corners.

CHARGE OF ROBBERY .- A constable in the lower part of the city was arrested yesterday on the charge of robbing an ex-Alderman of the Second Ward of four thousand dollars. In accepting the resignation the Board of Directors paid a high tribute to Mr. Lewis for the untiring energy and great ability he manifested, and deeply sympathized with him because of the state of health he is laboring under.

THE FENIANS.—At a meeting of the officers of the Fenian Brotherhood, held yesterday alter-noon, under the call of Mr. Andrew Wynne, the District Centre, it was determined to hold a grand ratification meeting in this city about the middle of the present week, when Colonel O'Mahony, B. Doran Killian, Colonel Mullen, and other prominent Feninus are expected to address the Brotherhood.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT .- Robert McFarland, aged 22, who resided in Twenty-third street, be-tween Race and Vine, had his face and eyes injured on Saturday by the explosion of a blast at Fairmount Park.

THE HIBERNIA STEAMER.-A communication has been received from Chief Engineer Dickson, of the United States Steam Fire Brigade of Washington, saving that, as the ergine which was to have taken the place of the Hibernia in that city is badly out of repair, and will require at least a month's work to render it effective, the departure of the Hibernia will be delayed for some weeks yet.

UNION SCHOOL AND CHILDREN'S HOME. The sixteenth anniversary of the Union School and Children's Home will take place at St. Andrew's Church, Eighth street, above Spruce, this evening at 7½ o'clock. Mr. Pook has been in the service of the Government since 1841, and was last on duty at the Portsmouth Navy Yard. He takes the place here made vacant by the resignation of Mr.
