The coarse texture of the Quincy granite necessarily admits of but little ornamentation; but what it loses in this way is more than made up by the imposing aspects of a well-proportioned editice of massive construction in this material, as is shown by the Jayne buildings and the Pinladelphia Bank. ST. JOSEPH'S HOSPITAL .- The report of St. Joseph's Hospital for 1865 has just been issued, from which it appears that since the establishment of the Hospital on the 1st of January, 1859, there have been 3639 cases treated, of which 2066 were pay patients and 1573 poor patients. Of the whole number, 2906 were cured, 195 refleved, 140 removed, 322 died and 70 remained on the let of January, 1866. The total receipts from pay patients for seven years amounted to \$63.187.51; and the total expenses for the same period were \$109,785 90. From the opening of this institution by the Sisters of Charity, over 1500 indicent patients have been treated and supported gratuitously. Although a Catholic institution, patients are admitted of all creeds.

THE PENNSYLVANIA HORTICULTURAL Society,-The regular monthly meeting and exhibition of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society was held on Tuesday evening. LECTURE BY PROFESSOR ROGERS,-"A GLANCE AT THE WORLD WE LAVE IN'-THE ACADEMY OF MUSIC THEOROGO.—Last evening, a very large audience greeted Professor B. C. Rogers, M. D., of the University of Pennsylvania, on the occasion of his lecture for the beneat of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home. Many hours of care and toil had been given to the preparation of models for the practical illustration of the prominent forces and operations of nature. The stage was covered with these models, and he varied groupings of the machinery had a

Professor Rogers alluded to the times of the war through which the country had just passed He reflected on what we all owel to those who had lain on the cold earth, with no covering but the blue arch overhead, who had battled for us amid privations and miserles, and he was now prepared to lay his little mite at their feet. He felt that God would biess these benevolent ladies and gentlemen, who were aiding the great cauce of justice in supporting the Soldiers' and Sailors'

His theme was the world that God had made, What a beautiful creation it was! Gravitation holds by an iron chain the planets circling in their orbits, restraining them, and reaching far into infinity to govern even the comets. Heat and light alike governed all materials. Let any atom not do its part of the great work, and confusion and anarchy would be inevitable. The most important apparent consideration in the contemplation of the Universe is the law of change, yet it always performed according to fixed rules. The particle that floated in the air was as immutably governed by fixed, unalterable

laws as the great planetary systems.
Unity was the law that governed the universe. In Christianity the Trinity prevails, but in the material world God held this globe in the palm of His hand. Matter was wnat impressed the senses, and was only known by that apprecia-tion. Thus unity here prevailed, but does that matter differ from the law of unity? Is it annihilated or only mutilated? Experiment would how that matter was never destroyed, but only changed, simply brought from one form into another. Talus matter, while obeying the law of gravity, obeys the law of never being des-

Force of matter is recognized mostly by motion. Motion gives us the conception of something that is moved, which associates with When an object moves it is not by force of itself, but it is simply an action or exhibition of force. Force cannot be supposed to be destroyed, because the flat of God may be rightly judged to declare that while matter cannot be destroyed, force is likewise eternal. Motion can be changed in its mode of pheno-mena into light, heat, electricity, magnetism,

The Professor then proceeded to demonstrate practically that the study of nature would unfold gems and treasures of poetry and romance; that chemistry and natural philosophy contained the materials for enjoyment and instruction in ample profusion. The first experiment consisted in placing an in-

visible, impalpable agency into balancing cones, so that the cones were alternately projected upward and downward. A large series of experiments were performed by the Professor, with interesting, curious, and startling effects. Yet, when the explanations were given, the results produced were evidently founded on scientific principles. The paper cone that was borne downward by the inpouring of an invisible agent was filled with choke-damp, heavy air, or carbonic acid. The reversed cone that was propelled upward was filled from underneath with hydrogen, much lighter than common air.

Professor Rogers presented, in corroboration

of the principles which he had enunciated in his opening address, many experiments, the popular descriptions of which would be impossible, but beholding of which was profoundly inte-

resting.

Professor Rogers, returning thanks for the aid rendered by his assistant, by Dr. Hunt, Mr. Parrish, Dr. Dorrens, of New York, and other distinguished gentlemen, for the ensuing experi-ment, exhibited, by shadows castion a screen, a beautiful illustration of the decomposition of water by galvanic action, the hydrogen and ovy-gen gases freed being magnified so as to be visible to the entire audience.

After other pleasing experiments, illustrative of the immutable laws governing the forces of nature, the lecturer would have concluded his discourse, had not the unanimous voice of the audience requested its extension, and near 11 o'clock the vast assembly dispersed, highly edifled and delighted with the evening's entertain-

COUNCILS MUST BE ECONOMICAL.-The City Controller, in his annual report, shortly to be published, will submit several suggestions to Councils in reference to the financial condition of the city. He says that "the income from municipal sources, with the tax collected in 1865, could not possibly equal the expenditures, increased as they were above the amount com-puted from the requirements of the several Departments returned on the 1st of November, 1864, thy increase of salaries, cost of supplies and labor, and the large demand in the early part of the year for the payment of appropriations for bounties beyond the amount of loan authorized for that purpose; and with the sent rates of tax for 1866, it is almost entirely dependent on Councils whether it will be adequate to meet the demands of the Departments, and sufficient to restore public confidence in the securities of the city, so that the loans may be sold and maintained at par, of suffered to depreciate; and with the loans now on hand disposed of at par, it will be by the most rigid economy ignoring extra appropriations, that the estimated resources will prove sufficient to meet the known

requirements of the city."
There is, perhaps, no more important office in the municipal government than that or City Controller; or none requiring greater energy probity, and business sagucity. Mr. Joseph R Lyndall, the present incumbent, in the dis-charge of his official duties has exhibited these business qualities in a pre-eminent degree. His coming report, of which we give a synopsis above, will be found to be a most satisfactory exhibit of the financial condition of our city.
