Previous to the announcement of the regular toasts, the President professed the health of Major-General Meade, which created much en-thusiasm. After the applause had subsided, General Meade arose and returned his sincere thanks for the honor conterred. When he re-crived an invitation to be present, he asked nimself the reason ne had been invited to a festival of that character, and could not answer the ques-tion until i.e sat down to the table, when, from the number of friends he saw around him, it seemed to him that all his mends belonged to the Philadelphia Board of Brokers. He remembered two officers who were formerly members of the Board, and who lied in the service of the country, Major Henry J. Biddlo and Colonel Richard W. Woolworth. In noticing all these things he saw that there was some connection between the army, or numself as representing it, and the Board of Brokers, and could therefore understand why he had been invited to be pre-sent at the feativities of the evening.

General Meade closed his well-timed remarks by congratulating those present on the close of the war, and alluding in glowing terms to the fact that the country was now united forever, from the St. Lawrence to the Gulf of Mexico. Commodore Selfridge made a few remarks in

response to a toast to the navy. His speech was characterized with the modesty usually exhibited by naval commanders in like situations. He paid a tribute to the United States Navy, and expressed a desire to give satisfaction in his new capacity of Commandant at the Philadel-phis Navy Yard. A number of other volunteer toasts were given, and the party separated at an carly hour, after a delightfully spent evening.


