evening in the West Arch Street Presbyterian Church, W. A. Tenbrook, Esq., in the Chair. The proceedings were opened with prayer by Rev. W. F. Eya, after which the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The Committee on Legislature reported through their Chairman, Rev. Dr. Junkin, who made some very impressive remarks respecting the prospect of maintaining the cause through the

In alluding to some articles which had appeared in a morning paper of this city, he said that great ignorance had been shown by the writer of the articles in question. Base attacks and been made on great and good men, and in quorations, much injustice had been done to the authors from which he had quoted. Rev. J. Wheaton Smith, D. D., offered the fol-

lowing resolution:-Resolved, That while no proper effort should be omitted for the prevention of the contemplated violation of the Sabbath, our attention should be specially directed to existing and greater violations of the day.

He advocated the resolution in a few forcible remarks, and stated that there ought to be a decided action among Christians and all moral men in reference to the rum shops of this city, and stated that if these should be closed we need not fear that Sunday papers or car running on the Sabbath would meet with encouragement. Remarks were also made by Rev. Dr. Johnson, Mr. Steinmetz, and others, favoring the resolution, which was passed unanimously.

A communication was received from Jay

Cooke, Esq., expressing his hearty sympathy with the movement, and regretting that, owing to his residence being out of town, he would be obliged to decrine serving as President. The re-

signation was accepted.

The committee to visit the Mayor in reference to the closing of taverns on Sundays, were vested with power to add to their number. The clerk was requested to have the constitu-tion and list of officers published in the papers.

On motion it was resolved that when the neeting adjourn it be to meet at the call of the Chairman and Secretary. On motion, the Secretary and President of the meeting were instructed to call the Board of Managers together at such time as desired. Rev. Dr. Brainerd favored the agitation of the ques-tion of closing taverns on Sunday. He was persuaded that if hal already done good. Said he, "Let us persevere, and we will have success." The meeting was then closed with prayer by Rev.

THE EDUCATION OF METHODIST MINIS-TERS.—Last evening, at the Union M. E. Churca, a meeting was held in regard to one of the special objects by which it is proposed to commemorate the centenary anniversary of the establishment of the Methodist Church in this country-Denominational Education. It will be remembered that it was proposed to raise two millions of dollars as a permanent fund to edu-cate ministers of the M. E. Church. To further this purpose was the design of this meeting.

Bishop Ames addressed the meeting at length, adverting to the evident fact that the prosperity and life of a nation depend upon the diffusion of knowledge and intelligence among the people; and adverted to the history of the past Republics of Greece and Rome, tracing the causes of their downfall in the lack of virtue and education

among the masses.

The Centenary Anniversory particularly commends this great duty of educating the future preachers to the hearts and sympathies of all the Church to fulfili, the declaration that to whom much was given much shall be required. The colleges of the Church are great balance-wheels, that keep up and equalize the circulation from age to age. The people scarcely know yet this conservatism, but in the future they shall

possess its power.

Bishop Simpson referred to the great numbers of the Church, it having about nine hundred and thirty thousand communicants within it. Thus, God having blessed them with such vast numbers, has devolved upon them a more earnest and greater task than other denominations. These others had older and better endowed theological seminaries. This was not true in the West, wherein, in some States, they had more colleges and more students, but in the East the reverse was the case, from the other Protestant ground and preoccupied the deld. Thus arises the necessity of greater exertions to enlarge the seminaries, to cultivate and gather in the fruits of the harvest. He honored other churches for their great advancement; he bade them God speed therein; but the Methodist Church must awake to the necessity of this action, or it will lose most of the young persons from its own communion, they being attracted otherwise by the power of educational associations. For these associations are very strong, and the church that controls their education will obtain the greatest

THE INSANE AT THE ALMSHOUSE .- On January 1, 1865, there were in the institution 562 patients, 202 men and 360 women, 35s in all, giving a total of 921 who were under treatment during the year. The dally average of patients was 190 men, 376 women; 574 in all. Few persons, perhaps, have any idea that there are so many insane people in Philadelphia, yet this is only one of the several institutions of the kind. During the year there were 353 patients dis-charged as follows:—

Men. Women, Total.

December 31, 1865, there remained in the institution 199 men, 369 women, 568 in all; showing an increase for the year of only six, there being an actual diminution of three men, and an increase of nine women.

In his report Dr. Butler urges that the building now occupied by the insane poor of Phila-delphia be devoted to the purposes of a House of Correction, and that new buildings, better adapted to the curative treatment of the patients, be erected on a farm further removed than the present location from the city. He thinks that there are men enough among the parients to work a farm of titty acres, and that with proper facilities a large part of the labor of the institution of all kinds can be performed by the patients, both male and female.

ADMINISTERING RAW-HIDE. - Yesterday on Chesnut street, above Eighth, a fashiona-bly dressed young woman was seen to approach a fall man wearing a military cap, and as soon as she got within striking distance to apply a cowhide to his shoulders. The attack took him by surprise, and he did no more for a few moments than try and ward off the blows. Recovering himself, he seized the cowhide and attempted to wrest it from her grasp. This he was not able to do, and finding a large crowd gathering, he took refuge in a neighboring house. Upon his leaving his assailant walked off. Persons stated that he was a General in the volunteer service, and the reason for the chas-tisement was the circulation of reports prejudicial to the character of the assailant.

HEARING OF PROFESSIONALS .- Yesterday afternoon the batch of professional thieves arrested upon the charge of being implicated in the robbery of J. T. Taylor, of Ohio, of his pocket-book containing \$500, had a hearing at the Central Station. Mr. Taylor was unable to recognize any of the prisoners as having been pre-sent on the platform of the car at the time he was robbed. They were accordingly discharged. Chief Detective Franklin stated that hereafter when theirs were committed he intended to visit all dens where professional thieves were in the habit of congregating, and arrest every one found there, and warned them not to frequent

such haunts. MAN DROWNED,-About half-past eleven o'clock last night an unknown man fell overboard at Green street wharf, and was drowned, m spite of the efforts of about a dozen police officers to save him.

MATTERS OVER THE RIVER.

PROSPECTIVE IMPROVEMENTS .- The coming spring will open with brilliant prospec's for Camden. There are a number of improvements projected, including several business structures, ind heavy contracts are already made for the erection of dwellings in various parts of the city and suburbs. A company of capitalists has been formed with the view of supplying the increasing demand for houses. It is said they will put up about one hundred this year, and will add from year to year to meet the requirements of our growing city. Mr. Garrison will also build a row of houses on his grounds in North Ward; and several of our citizens, in each of the Wards, will add to the number. This spirit of enterprise will extend over the city line, and infuse new life into Kaighnton; and on the side of Brace road, over the city line, James Henry, Esq., has just completed a splendid residence near the Newton school house, in which vicinity several houses were built last year, and more are contracted for. Altogether, the build-ing prospects of Camden are very encouraging for the coming year.

ENLARGING THE CITY BOUNDS .- The propriety of enlarging the city bounds, by embrac-ing all the suburbs within the corporate limits of Camden, is freely discussed and warmly advocated by a number of our citizens. Several propositions in regard to the line have been made, and there seems to be more diversity of opinion upon this question than upon the necessity of consolidation. One line advocated is to take in all west of the Mount Ephraim road, making a continuous line to John M. Kaighn's property, even with the "Line Ditch," and continue to the bridge over the same. Others desire to strike a straight line from Cooper's Creek Bridge south, and continue south until all of Centreville and Stockton is embraced in the city limits. We believe our rural neighbors are by no means desirous of the association.

NEEDS REPAIRING .- The Camden County Court House is in a bad condition in many respects, and needs immediate repairing. One of these detects is the bad arrangement of the flues. which admit the foul odors from the sicks and prison cells into the Court Room, filling the apartment with noxious vapors, which interfere materially with the transaction of business. These detects should be at once remedied, for they make it unhealthy for the judges, and all who have business to transact during the ses-

CHICKEN STEALING .- There seems to be a gang of theeves prowling about the suburbs of of Camden, whose special aims and business seem to be in stealing chickens, geese, turkeys. etc. A short time time since one man lost about twenty-five turkeys, which he never recovered Very little mercy is shown to these depredators when caught and convicted. On Monday one of them took a voyage to Trenton, under the care and guidance of the Sheriff, where he has been assigned to special duty for a year in the State penitentiary.
