## MATTERS OVER THE RIVER.

MANUFACTURING INTERESTS. - The lacilities afforded by the eastern boundary of the city of Camden have attracted to this point a haze manuscturing capital, which is employed in various branches of that development of indus-try. The banks of Cooper's creek are high, and the waters deep, sufficiently available for vessels of large size to ascend with materials used. There are cobalt and chemical works, iron foundries, machine shops, rolling mills, colton factories, and other manufactories, all of which are in successful operation, and employ a large number of workmen. Almost every hour of the day huge wagons, drawn by stalwart horses, and loaded with the different products of these hives of industry, or with the raw materials used in these manufactories, are a en trundling along the streets, indicating that a large and profitable business is thus carried on. So many advantages are offered to manufacturing in terests on this creek, that a number of new e tablishments are soon to be erected, and these will give additional activity to the business aspect of the eastern part of the city. The ex-tensive log-wood milis of the Messrs. Browning are situated on this stream, and carry on a large business, furnishing drugs to nearly all parts of the country. It is the manufacturing estab-lishments that give activity and life to a city, and it will not be many years before the entire shores of Cooper's creek will become studded with manufactories, and the business prospects of Camden advanced in a hundred-fold ratio. To accommodate these interests large numbers of new dwelling-houses will also be built for the workmen, and thus the outsearts of the city whi be compactly built up.

AT IT AGAIN .- We learn that the effort to construct a railroad from the Junction or Jackson Station to Pennsgrove or Pennsylle, will, again be renewed this winter. It is proposed to branch off from the Raritan and Delaware Bay Railroad, touching at Williamstown, Glassboro, and across Gloucester into Salem county, passing Swedes-boro, and down to one of the places named, where a boat will connect with Wilmington, or sufficiently near to intercept either the Balti-more route, or the Delaware road which leads to Sea'ord. As far as New Jersey is concerned, this enterprise cannot be of the smallest benefit. Our West Jersey roads are all-sufficient for the agricultural, commercial, and travelling interests of the lower counties; and the proposed road is only calculated to direct trade and travel from Philadelphia to New York, or southward. The existing roads connect with two roads to New York in a few hours, and our farmers already have a choice between the markeis of the two great cities, so that we see no possible advantage to be derived by Jerseymen, while it must prove detrimental to Philadelphia. New York capitalists are at the bottom of this scheme; and with this road running south, and the proposed sir-line road to run north of Phila-delphia, that city will be between two fires. The people of this section are opposed to being used as catepaws to drag hot chesnuts out of the fire for Wall street stock-obbers and speculators to

NEW BOATS .- A commendable spirit of rivelry seems to have been awakened at our dif-Jerent ferries, in regard to improvements upon derry boats. The Delaware, the Camden, the West Jersey, and the Atlantic, are first-class boats, capacious, strong, and swift, and finished in the best style of mechanical art. Those who remember the old, clumsy, rolling "tubs," with small, narrow cabins, can scarcely realize this agreeable change. It is evidence of progress in the right quarter, and no improvements are better calculated to advance the growtn of Camden.

Shocking Tragedy-A House Burned and Four Children Perished in the Flames. From the Shakopee, Minn., Argus, 11th.

One of the most heart-rending accidents by fire that has ever come to our notice, took place on the opposite side of the river, and about two miles from Belle Plain, on the night of Thursday last. The name of the unfortunate family was Shilock, composed of Mr. and Mrs. Shilock and five children, the oldest some eight or ten years of age. During the night Mrs. Shilock awoke and found the house in flames, when she immediately sprang from the bed, and remembering the four children in the other room, that was reached by a passage, she rushed to their

Mr. Shilock followed an instant later, but in his passage broke through the burning door and fell into the cellar. By a desperate effort, almost sufficient by heat and smoke, he again reached the bed which he had left, and grasping the sleeping babe, threw it through a window which he broke out; but upon turning to see what had become of his wife, he was met by the flames, and but barely escaped by the window through which he had thrown his child. Upon reaching the outside, he heard the cries wite from the entry way, or narrow hall, who had been frant cally endeavering to gain the room occupied by the children, until she herself had become surrounded by fire.

Through almost superhuman exertions he succeeded in bursting in the door and rescuing her, although both were teribly burned. They now used every exertion to save the children, but all to no purpose, and soon they were enabled to see the four standing together in the middle of the room, clinging to each other, with their eyes raised toward- heaven, in which position they were consumed by the flames, in full sight of their agonized parents, who could lend them no

What must have been their feelings? Nothing, of course, was saved, and there they were, some ways from assistance, left almost childless in the manner described, themselves badly burned, and exposed to the bitter cold weather, with no protection but their night-clothes. They succeeded in reaching a neighbor's house, where they were cared for in a proper manner. The charred remains of the four children were afterwards taken from the house.

The Bagpipes not Scotch, but English. At a meeting in Edinburgh, the Lord Advo-cate said:—"Most people think that the bagpipe is a Scotch instrument. Some are proud of the bagpipe, others are afraid of it-but, whether by its triends or its foes, the bagpipe is looked upon by us as something national. Now, I am not at all sure that we are cutitled to any such praise or blame. I believe it could be demonstrated though our friends on the other side of the Tweed would be excessively indignant-I believe it could be demonstrated that the bagpape is an English instrument-essentially English-that the English were the original bagpipers; and I find in confirmation of this that Shakespeare, who was an authority in music, refers to the bagpipes constantly; but he does not introduce them into Macbeth. The armies in Macbeth don't march on Dunsmane to the sound of the bag-pipe, and he speaks of the drone of the Lincolnshire and the Yorkshire bagpine. He speaks of a person 'laughing like a parrot at a bagpiper, but all without the slightest Caledonian refer ence. And when we look at the works in the Register House, and show now our tormer monarchs spent their income, we find their ex-penditure for music put down in such entries as the following:—'To the English piper, three shillings and sixpence,' Scotchmen were not the pipers, they were harpere. The harp was the old Scotch instrument, and I believe continued to be the old Scotch instrument till within a very recent period."
