REPORT OF THE WILLS HOSPITAL.-The thirty-first annual report of this institution shows the expenses of the past year amounted to \$12,304.68. The number of patients treated during the year was 248. Of these there were admitted during the year, 224. Number dischurged during the year, 252. Leaving under treatment December 31, 1863, 16. Of those dis-charged there were:—Cured, 127; improved, 81; incurable, 18; cloped, 5; died, 1. During the year there were two hundred and

fourteen surgical operations performed in the hospital. From patients and other sources there has been received and paid to the City Treasurer, during the year, the sum of \$2382.23.

FIRST GERMAN REPORMED CHURCH .-The old church property belonging to the First German Reformed congregation, in Race street, near Fourth, has been offered for sale by the trustees. It is the intention of the congregation to locate in a more central position, many of the members having removed to distant parts of the city. This is one of the oldest and most in-fluential churches of this persuasion in this section, the labors of Rev. Dr. Homberger, the pas-tor, having been crowned with signal success. During the past few weeks a series of interesting and instructive meetings have been held in the church for the purpose of giving proper cate-chetical instruction to those who form the younger porti n of the membership.

THE YOUNG MENNERCHOR .- One of the most brilliant and attractive masquerade balls ever given in Philadelphia takes place at the Academy of Music on Monday evening, under the auspices of the Young Monnerchor Associa-The festivity is got up for social entertainment, and not for pecuniary purposes, and consequently will be most select. FENIAN BROTHERHOOD. -A Convention of the Fenian Brotherhood, District of Philadelphia, was held on Tuesday evening, eleven Circles being represented. fir. J. A. Keenan, District Centre, presided. A Committee on resolutions reported a series, in which devotion to the cause of trish liberty is realizmed, and the friends of Irish nationality are urged to supply material aid in furtherance of it.

ALLEGED HIGHWAY ROBBER.-Barney Rourke was committed for a further hearing yesterday asternoon, at the Central Station, on the charge of having been implicated in the robbing of F. W. Weest, residing at Twenty-third and Lombard streets. Mr. Weest was waylaid, knocked down, and robbed of his watch, about nine o'clock on the evening of the 23d instant.

FIFTY-EIGHTH PENNSYLVANIA REGI-MENT.—The 58th Pennsylvania Regiment, Colonel Cecil Clay, arrived here yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock, from Baltimore, and proceeded to Camp Cadwalader. This was formerly Colonel J. Richter Jones' regiment, and it has done important duty to the Government. It was organized in July, 1861.

SOCIETY FOR ALLEVIATING THE MISE-RIES OF PRISONS,-This soc etv held its eightieth anniversary on Thursday evening. It still pursues its quiet career of usefulness. The most important work which it has on hand is that of many cases, simply schools or crime.

THE BOYS' HIGH SCHOOL,-The semi-annual commencement of the Boys' Central High School will take place at the Academy of Music on the 15th of February. The examination for the admission of candidates commences on Monday, the 5th inst. The examination of the pupils of the school is now in progress.

SLIGHT FIRE AT THE NAVY YARD .- A slight fire occurred about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon on board the United States supply steamer South Carolina, which is anchored at the north dock of the Navy Yard. It was extinguished by means of the engine at the yard.

PROFESSIONAL COMMITTED.-Barney Mc-Ilhenny, an alleged professional thief, was arrested at the Academy of Music, on Thursday evening by Detective Henderson. At a hearing yesterday afternoon he was committed to prison for ninety days.

LIGHTHOUSES ON THE SOUTHERN COAST,-In consequence of Congress having as yet failed to upon the recommendations of the Chief, of the Lighthouse Board, very little progress has been made in the work of re-establishing lighthonses on the Southern coast. There are yet upwards of eighty lighthouses and boats along the coast from the mouth of the Chesapeake Bay to the coast of Texas that need to be put in working order. Many of the houses and boats are only partially damaged, and would require very little time and expense to thoroughly repair them, while again some of the most extensive works have been entirely destroyed. As soon as Congress makes an appropriation for this purpose, the work will commence in earnest .- National Intelligencer.
