THE GERMANTOWN MURDER-ADDI-TIONAL STIDANCE.—The following additional evidence in this important trial was elicited vesterday afternoo Benjamin Franklin, Chief Detective-I first

went to Germantown on Saturday evening, but not see the prisoner until Sunday morning, at the Station House, Germantown; asked what time he left home the previous Saturday morning; he said half-past six o'clock A. M. and came down Main street to Queen street, and waited at Queen street for one of the passenger cars, to see driver, named "Sandy," that he was acquainted with; he wanted to go into town, and had no money; he wanted to rife into town; I asked what he was going to town for; he said to get some morey; I asked who from; he said from a man named Harry; he did not know his last name that he had seen this Harry the previous Thursday, and he promised to let bim have the money that morning; he was to meet him at Needle's Mills, and as the car did not come in he walked in down the Germantown road; he said he met Harry at 8 o'clock; he said he could not get the money, as Harry had not got if; he came up Girard avenue to Sixth struct, and mot a man named John Stall, who owed him fifty dollars; he asked for it, and Stall realied he had it, and night as well pay him thea, which he did; he described the money; give no receipt; he said he then passed up Girard avenue to Eighth street; got in one of the Lighth street cars and real avent to Gementic the bit of the street cars. rode out to Germantown; not out of the car at School lane, and prid a bill at Vanderslice's store; he bought some groceries there, and then went home; he said he paid the nurse nine doi-lars, and subsequently paid money to the drug-gist, and one dollar and thirty cents to the gro-cer; his boot was then taken off his toot; there was some discoloration on the inside of the sole that looked like blood, and it was so stated to the prisoner; he said that might be, as he had stepped on a piece of best as he had entered Vandershee's store the evening provious; he then said it might have been a liver; that was about all that was said at that time, and Mr. Taggart took or went with the prisoner into another

Detective Officer Joshua Targart, sworn-First saw the prisoner at the Germantown Station Howe; was at the interview described by Mr. Franklin; I went into another room with the prisoner, to get him away from the crowd, to talk to him alone: I said to him, "Chris., I want to have a talk with you about this money; the statement you have made in reference to this money is unfortunate for you, for I am satisfied it is not true; I am satisfied you have committed some crime to get it, and while we are wasting time in looking atter this matter the real culprit who committed this murder may escape, and if that is the case I would like to know it now; tell me the truth: you have committed any petty crime to get this money, or farceny, outside of this marder case, I won't use it against you;" I told him flat-footed that I did not believe his story about Harry and Stall,

The prisoner's counsel here objected to the witness giving prisoner's answer or statement, on the ground that an inducement had been neld out to him to make it.

## OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

#### Abuses that Should be Abolished-The Faculty System-Its Cause and Remedy, Etc. Etc.

To the Editor of the Evening Telegraph :---

Now that the war is ended, we can in a measure turn our attention from national to local interesta. As education is that which moulds and shapes the habits and manners, the tastes and aspirations of a people-as it underlies the morality, the industry, and the patriotism of a nation-as it gives character its force, business its dignity, commerce its impetus and the home circle its beauty and happiness-it well becomes us to examine whether our school system meets the exigencies of the times and the demands of the nation-whether ourischools are superintended in such a manner, and instruction imparted in such a form, as shall in bue the youthful mind with ideas and principles which will be of utility to themselves and others. Our public schools have achieved much. They have sent forth to the pulpit, to the bar, to the sick bed, to the store, and to the workshop, imen who are ornaments to their profession or occupation. They have polished the diamono that lay concealed in poverty's home. They have made young ladies good teachers for our schools and good wives) for our mon. Those achievements are not, however, in consequence, but in spite of our system of controlling and directing our schools. Our manner of selecting School Directors and Contro lers by public election, has been and is increasingly fraught with detriment to the cause of education.

Our School Directors generally seek the office to gratify an empty ambition. The truly intelligent have in various instances refused the office, not be cause they took no interest in our educational institutions and facilities, but because they objected to identification with men generally devoid of Intelligence and refinement. The Directors are, for the most part, it not ignorant, at least superficial mon. That there are a tew who have well-informed minds, with an ability to reduce to practice what theoretical knowledge they have, we are tree to concede, and just as free to regret that their worth and influence are lost from a want of cooperation. The decided majority of D rectors are men like one of whom we heard some days since, who, when asked by the principal if the children could go home, in consequence of the intensely cold room, said :--"Well, it's right inclement, but it will soon modu late;" or, like another, who, when shown some of the pupils' writing, said :- "Yes, them children writes very good, considerin." They are men who can walk into the school-room with hats on, and address the teachers in charge as Kate, Salhe, or Jane, minus the Miss. They are, in some cases, men who can walk from the beer saloon to the class-room. Men who often talk faster than they think, who can tell a vulgar joke well, blow the trumpet of their own praise louder than any one else, and make braggadocia promises of what they will do if once in office. Through considerable wire-pulling they ingratia e themselves in the esteem or a few demagogue-politicians, and thus receive the nomination of the party. The election pending, promises are made to various parties that they, or their relatives, shall have positions in this or that school as teachers, and the drinking-houses in the section are visited, where bad gin buys many a vote. The intelligent people in the section, or ward, ignorant of the ta'ents and character of the candidates, imagine all is right that is sanctioned by their party, and, therefore, vote according to their political predilections. The teachers in charge, who are most com, etent to judge as to the merit of Directors, are compelled, in view of the forfeiture of their position, to be silent. Theirs is a dubious position, not knowing whom it is safe to recommend for the interests of the school and the safety of their positions. To involve themselves in no difficulty or loss, there are some teachers who denv themselves the right of suffrage. But just the very men who have resorted to the most grovelling influences, and who were most indefatigable in collecting and buying up votes, are elected, and become our public schools' superintendents. It is a blot upon the fair name of our city and a disgrace to our public school system, that men devoid of principle, percept bly ignorant, and immoral in character, should be placed at the head of and associate with ladies whose talents are good, manners polite, and hearts pious. Something should be done at once to raise the standard of school directors and controllers, otherwise we will soon have a corps of teachers whose character and abilities will be on the same level. They shou'd be appointed by the Mayor, regardless of political preference. The Legis, lature or our Councils could invest him with such power. It would be unnecessary to retain the same number we now have. A smaller number, but embracing more intelligence and system, would answer a better purpose. This suggestion may have its objections, yet the fact remains, that the superintendence of public schools should be improved. The fact still remains, that men who direct and control our schools should give satisfactory evidence that they have abilities to discriminate between what is thorough and superficial instruction in a teacher. They should be men who feel their responsibility, and not their authority. They should fully comprehend the nature and I thereon previous to February 3.

oljects of education, and therefore only adopt ruch systems of instruction, and only recommend such discipline in the school-room, as they honestly think will promote education in general, and the special interests of the school which they superintend in particular. They should be men imbued not mercly with an affai slry of manner and a polite address, but should have a high sense, apart from sectarianism, of what is right and wrong and should have the consistency of character, and the courage; which a sense of right begets, to speak to teachers of what their duties are, and what in turn is required of the pupils. Should teachers not exhibit the snocers anticipated, they should examine all the obstaeles in the way, before expressing the least shadow of suspicion that duty was avoided or negl-cted. A single failure should not be made the cause for immediate suspicion, for the best talent has falled in its first effort. Should failure be repeated until the Interests of the school would demand a change. It should be done with a dignity and carnestness which indicates that no personal interest . were consulted, no personal resentment gratified, and that no third party had interests at stake A successor should be chosen out of the various applicants, whose merit and circumstances slone should be considered, and no political influences or ties of nature should have weight. The new vocation which the person just appointed enters upon should be freed from every available embartassment, and made pleasant as early as practica ble, to allow the free exercise of energy. The Directors should encourage a warm feeling and unanimity of purpose among the various teachers of the different departments.

The difficulties between the Grammar and High Schools, which the teachers from both deplore and labor hard to prevent, have doubtiess their source in he miserable Boards of Directors and Controllers To shield our Central High School from assault, like that which it has recently received in our conner Chamoer, there must be men appointed who have the strength of intellect and the force of character to blend and unite the efforts of the various detarti-mentiz-teachers and pupils to reach one high object As long as discordant interests are tolerated amon : Directors and Courtellors, so long will discordant elements a lorger unterdingt from encording greeable. That there may be a change or improve ment soon made, is the ardent wish or AN OBSERVER.

nal sum m tillers' bonds should be double the amount of duties upon the monthly production of the dis The Collector should at once examine tillery. the bond of each distiller in his district, and i the penal sum does not conform to the rule. should require a new bond. No bond should be approved unless the surctices make oath that they have no interest in the distillery, and that they are worth the amount qualified to, above their debts. A new bond is requisite whenever there is reason to believe that the sureties have ac-quired an interest or are unable to respond to the amount justified. When a distiller relative to whom strong suspleion is entertained, applies for license, the Collector will see that the penal sum is of ample amount and the sureties able to respond in damages.

TRUSTY BURGLARS .- About ten days ago the residence of Mrs. M. H. Stephens, on Rittenouse street, near Green, was broken into and robbed of clothing and other valuables. The hieves effected an entrance through a cellar window, and finding the door at the head of the cellar stairs bolted, they bored through the panel and shoved back the bolt. Officer Kendig arrested four colored men, named Henry Trusty, Samuel Bass, Samuel H. Lane, and Edward W. Clarion, on the charge of committing the burglury.
