BOUNTY EQUALIZATION.—MEETING OF SOLDIERS, SAILORS, AND MARINES.—The mass meeting of soldiers, sailors, and marines held on Saturday evening, in front of Independence Hall, was very largely attended.

General Geary, in his note, suggested that "in the parable of the laborers in the vineyard it is stated that those who labored but one hour were for reasons good and sufficient to the master thereof, made equal to those who had borne the heat and burden of the whole day; but in no place can we find that Infinite Wisdom has declared that those who labored during the whole day received less than they who came in at a later period."

At the close of the reading of the letter, Col. Thomas stated that Governor Curtin was present, in order to testify by his presence his appreciation of their services in the field and his hope that what they asked would be granted.

In answer to repeated cries of "speech" Col. Thomas said that the Governor was unwell, and his physician had forbidden him to speak in the open air. Col. Thomas has truly said I am here to testify by my presence that I wish the object which brought you together shall be accomplished.

Whereas, To congregate in a cause like this, which has compelled us to assemble this evening, one of the objects of the meeting, under the circumstances of a like character never before arose in this great Republic—that of suppressing treason and traitors for the maintenance of the Government—and as thousands forfeited their lives, their limbs, and their property, leaving their families in very destitute circumstances in consequence thereof; and

Resolved, That we call upon the members of our National Legislature to use their efforts in advocating and voting for the passage of an act equalizing the bounties of those who rendered their services to the Government in its darkest hours of danger, and who sacrificed the comforts of home and the pleasant associations of their families to go forth to the field of strife in defense of their country's liberties.

Resolved, That our fellow-soldiers, seamen and marines throughout our common country, to meet in mass meetings, and urge upon their representatives in Congress to favor the passage of an act having for its object the purpose of equalizing the bounties of our brave co-operation with them in aiding and assisting in the passage of the said bill.

Resolved, That the soldiers, seamen, and marines now in mass meeting assembled, utterly repudiate the idea that the Government cannot pay the bounty by our friends and ourselves; and that we believe this money, distributed properly among the war-worn veterans, will be the means of giving an impetus to business and employment to our country's defenders.

Resolved, That our thoughts, as honorably discharged soldiers, seamen, and marines, are eminently due, and are hereby tendered to those whose voices and labor have been given in our behalf; and we shall ever hold in sacred remembrance those who, while unable to join us in the field and upon the sea, are anxious to place us on an equal footing with our younger comrades.
