the same character The Schuylkni becomes more frequently turbid as the country drained by it is orought under cutdva-tion. This is caused, not only by the tilinge of the land, but also by clearing the torests, which to a con-inderable extent held back the flood water, and pro-

The accumulation of much it the lower parts of the dam has increased in a much greater ratio this year than daring any previous one; other duries have so occupied the Department that no survey has been made, but the increase is so maked as to require no actual measurement to demonstrate it. The accumulations of much which are most objec-tionable, are that on the cast side of the river, be-tween the steamboat what and the Skating Cluo-house, and that on the west side of the river, be-tween the steamboat what and the Skating Cluo-former avenue Bridge to the orewory, each cover-ing from eighteen to twents acres. There is no doubt that these large areas of shallow water exert a dele-terious effect upon the entire river.
