THE NEW STEAM FRIGATE "CHATTA-NOOGA."-The United States steam frigate Chat tanooga is now completed and ready for sea. Her engines have been subjected to the usual ninety-six hour triels at the Navy Yard in our city, and have fully justified expectation. She will start on her trial trip in a few days, and on her return will probably make a trip to Europe. She will be commanded by Captain J. McKinstry, a gentleman well known for his prompt sup-pression of the naval bounty frauds, and the weeping reform which he instituted when he took command of the receiving ship North Carolina, in 1864. All the officers of the Chattanooga belong to the regular naval service, and she is said to be the only vessel in commission which has no volunteer officers. The Chattanooga having been constructed solely with a view to speed, it is confidently expected that with her great length, sharp lines, and powerful engine she will make at least thirteen knots an hour. She was built by Messrs, Cramp & Sons, of Kensington, and is a wooden propeller frigate of the fo lowing dimensions: Length, 336 feet; breadth of beam, 44 feet; depth of hold, 21 feet; draught of water when fully equipped, 17 feet; 3233 tons burden. She is the sharpest propeller man-of-war ever built in this country, and if there is anything in the model she has all the qualities of the fleetest vessel afloat. Her armament consists of sixteen

LEGISLATIVE ACTION INTERESTING TO PHILADELPHIANS.—Mr. Ruddiman, from the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives of our State Legislature, has recently submitted the following bill, which was read

submitted the following bill, which was read and appropriately referred:—

An Act Relating to Damages for Taking Property for Public Use in the City of Philadelphia.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonweath of Pennsylvanis in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the amount of damages to be assessed for taking any real estate or other taxable property in the city of Philadelphia for public use for a street, road, highway, public park, or other purpose, shall never exceed twice the highest amount of which the same has been assessed for taxation, and upon which taxes have been paid at any time within five years immediately preceding such taking, and the city of Philadelphia shall not pay any greater amount for property so taken.
