THE CITY CONVENTION .- Last evening the delegates of the Union party for the several Wards of Cainden held their City Convention, for the purpose of nominating a municipal ticket. Paul C. Budd, Esq., present incumbent, was renominated for Mayor. Although there was considerable competition at the primary meetings to recure detegates for other candi-dates, yet the nomination of Mr. Budd was almost a forcgone conclusion. No warmer and more energetic triend of the Union cause than Mayor Budd can be found in the city, and the arduous duties devolved upon him during the past iwofyears of his jofficial career have been performed with the utmost promputude and cor-rectares. ### Statkweather, the Murdcrer of His Mother and Sister, Sentenced to be Hung on

The Superior Court met ye terday, Chief Jus-tice Binman and Hon, Dwight W. Pardee on the bench. Albert L. Starkweather, the mur-derer of his mother and sister, in Manchester, last August, who had his trial three weeks are, was brought into the court-room handcuffed, under charge of Deputy Sheriff Dibble. He had very muca the same appearance as during the

On entering the prisoners' dock the cuffs were removed from his wrists, and he sat down, look-ing about, as he did so, at the spectators, over one hundred of whom were present, though no public notice had been given that the sentance was to be propounced. If there was any change perceptible in him different from his provious appearance when in the box, it was in his efforts to control himself against the exhibition of any unusual emotion: and some detected in the com pression of his lips and the rubbing together of his hands considerable nervous excitement, with a strong will at work to subdue it.
