Condition of Western Colleges.

Our educational interests naturally suffered to a considerable extent during the war. This was especially true of our Western Colleges, whose young men buckled on the armor with an unparalleled enthusiasm and unanimity. Since the close of hostilities, however, these various institutions have, as we learn from the recent report of the Society for the Promotion of Collegiate Education, regained most of their former prosperity.

Antioch College, Ohio, originally started under the Presidency of Horace Mann, begins the year under very favorable auspices. The Bellows and Starr King Professorships have been increased by subscriptions respectively of \$20,250 and \$20,000. Citizens of Providence, R. I., have recently donated the sum of \$29,500 for the establishment of a "Providence Profes-

Onvet College, located at the pleasant viliage of the same name in Michigan, is one of the most promising of the Western Universities. The buildings comprise one brick hall used as a dormitory, and erected as a cost of \$24,000, and one wooden half divided into recitation and lodging-rooms for young men. At a recent meeting of the Board of Trustees, it was voted to build a new editice during this year, costing forty or fifty thousand dollars. There is like-wise in connection with the college a chapel capable of seating four hundred persons, which, during the past year, has been refitted and en-larged at an expense of \$5000. This institution, which is modelled after Yale, though nominally under the control of the Congregational Church is yet designed to furnish educational facilities for every denomination. An effort is now being made to secure an endowment of \$100,000, which will place the College on a firm and permanent basis. President Morrison has been spending some weeks in the metropolis for this purpose, and is, we hear, meeting with encouraging success. Several subscriptions, ranging from \$5000

upward, have been secured.

AnniArbor (Michigan) College, has an attendance of 436 medical, 300 law, and 265 other students. Its finances are in a very flourishing-condition. Three new assistant professors have recently been appointed. The Institution is well

Oberlin (Ohio) College, of which President Finney, the Revivalist, was until quite recently the President, has enjoyed the patronage of between eleven and twelve thousand students since its foundation in the Western Reserve wilds, thirty years ago. The annual average attendance for the first fifteen years was 500; for the ten succeeding, 1200; and for the war period, 937. It has educated 300 colored stu-dents, and graduated 155 ministers, 34 lawyers,

dents, and grantated to minister, at tawyers, 16 physicians, 92 foreign missionaries, and 72 professors and teachers.

Towa College, located at Grinnell, suffered very much from the war, nearly all the young men at one time being absent in the tented field. Many of them have, however, returned to renew their studies, and a prosperous future opens up before it. A stone edifics in the town has recently been purchased and added to the College buildings.
