MATTERS OVER THE RIVER.

DROWNED BODY FOUND .- At a late hour yesterday atternoon the body of an unknown man floated ashore at one of the ship-yards at Cooper's Point, and was taken in charge by Coroner Roberts. Deceased had been in the water, from appearances, several weeks. He was pretty well dressed, had on a good suit of fancy cassimere steel-mixed cloth, and other clothing in correspondence; was five feet seven inches in height, and from thirty-five to forty years of age. His hair was rather light, but his whiskers of a sandy hue. Nothing was found upon his person except a small silvercased Swiss watch, a few photographs taken in Germany, and several visiting-cards containing names of different individuals. He was a German, and the body has been appropriately interred by the Coroner.

THE HIGHTSTOWN FIRE,-The disastrous conflagration at Hightstown, mentioned in yesterday's Telegraph, was attended by serious loss. Eighteen buildings and a large amount of goods and furniture were consumed, reaching a loss of nearly \$50,000. There is not a single fre-engine owned in the village, but this terrible calamity will no doubt atimulate the citizens to renewed and successful energy in properties. renewed and successful energy in procuring one. It is thought that with the assistance a good fire-engine would have given much of the property destroyed could have been saved.

Melancholy Accident. DEATH OF COL. BOWERS, OF GEN. GRANT'S STAFF.

Gammison's Station, N. Y., March 6.—Colonel Bowers, Adjutant-General on Lieutenant-General Grant's Staff, was instantly killed to-day by falling between two cars, while attempting to get on a train which was just starting from this sta-tion, on the Hudson River Railroad. General Grant has ordered the remains to be sent to West Point, in the care of Major Hill.

[Colonel Bowers was a native of Illinois, a printer by trade, and formerly edited a Democratic newspaper in that State. He entered the army at the outbreak of the Rebellion, joining army at the outbreak of the Rebellion, joining General Grant during the operations against Forts Henry and Donelson. At the battle of Shiloh he was ordered to duty at Grant's head-quarters, and was appointed Aid-de-Camp. In November, 1862, he was appointed Major, and Judge Advocate of the Army of the Tennessee, and in September, 1863, was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel and Assistant Adjustent General. From that time until the surrangement tant-General. From that time until the surren-der of Lee he was General Grant's Chief Assistant Adjutant-General in the field, and was retained in the same position at Washington, when General Grant established his headquarters there. He was a conscientious and capable officer, and possessed the full confidence of General Grant, to whom his sudden and terrible death will be a severe affliction.]

The Mississippi Stay Law.—The High Court of Errors and Appeals in Mississippi decides that the Siay Law adopted by the Legislature at its last session is unconstitutional—first, because it violates the Constitution of the United States and also of Mississippi, both of which prohibit the passing of any law impairing the obligation of contracts; and, secondly, because it violates the provisions of the State Constitution, which declares "that the courts shall be always open and justice administered therein without sale, denial, or delay." The Mississippi Index says:—
"This decision, founded as it is in right and justice, will be halled with delight by our people. We denounced the law at the time of its passage, and record with pleasure this action of the judi-ciary which prevents it from going into opera-
