ARIZONA.

War with the Apache Indians-A Large Force of United States Troops Despatched from California to Arizona-General McDowell Commanding in Person, Etc.

San Francisco, February 9.—The Apaches of Arisona are in a fair way to catch what they richly deserve at last. Troops are being hurried forward as fast as possible from here to Fort Yuma, whence they will march into the interior of Arizona, and join in the grand attack on the Apaches which General Mason is now making. The 14th United States Infantry, to the number of over two thousand, have already left, and a portion of the lat United States Cavalry (late portion of the 1st United States Cavalry (late from New York) are at Los Angeles, being mounted for the campaign. These, added to the volunteers now with General Mason, the nutive Mexican cavalry in our service in Arizona, the irregular or Pimo and Maricopa Indian troops now in the service and giving a good account of themselves, will make a respectable force, and we look for stirring news from the land of gold and rattlesnakes this summer. General McDowell has gone forward in person to see how things are going on there, and if the Apaches do not come to grief now they never will. Uncle Sam will have another "Florida war" bill to settle, but the difference is this—Florida was not worth the money, while Arizona is one vast field of mineral weath, of the extent and value of which the people of the Atlantic States have to-day no adequate idea.

MEETING OF THE AGRICULTURAL SO-CIATY.—A regular stated meeting of the Phila-delphia Society for Promoting Agriculture was delphia Society for Promoting Agriculture was held this morning, at 11½ o'clock, at the rooms of the Society, Walaut street, above Seventh. The President, Craig Biddle, in the chair.

The President stated that since the last meeting a number of monthly reports of the Agricultural Society from June and July, 1865, had been received for distribution among the members.

The President then stated that a communication had been received from the Department of

tion had been received from the Department of Agriculture at Washington, relating to the great Universal Exhibition at Paris, in 1867. The communication asks for the co-operation of the Philadelphia Society for Promoting Agriculture, in relation to having the State represented in the Agricultural department of that exhibition.

A supplementary circular was also received, containing a variety of information in relation to the Paris exhibition, and stating that the exhibition building would cost 20,000,000 francs, and that each nation would be expected to bear its own expenses.
A circular was also received from Mr. Derby,

containing full details of matters connected with sending articles to the great exhibition.

Dr. Elwin thought that the Society should confer with the Phitadelphia Board of Trade in relation to sending articles to gaid exhibition.

Dr. Kennedy stated that we have never been properly represented at the different Worlds' Exhibitions, and it anything was sent it should be something striking, and that would make an impression on European judges. He thought that a matienal vessel should be secured to send goods to the Paris Exhibition. goods to the Paris Exhibition. The whole subject was referred to a Committee

consisting of Dr. Kennedy and Dr. Elwin.

A communication was received from Dr. Henry Cloak, late Veterinary Surgeon U. S. A., in relation to the Kinderpest, cattle plague and cattle pex. The communication states that the Kinderpest is not the smallpox.

A communication was also received from Mr. Jesse M. Williams, denying that the cattle disease prevailed in Montgomery county to any alarming extent. There is no more disease among cattle in that county at present than is generally the case, and there is no cause for any excitement on the

Dr. Elwin made some remarks in relation to Rinderpest. He had falled to discover anything like Rinderpest in Chester and Delaware coun-ties, but had met a few cases of pleura pneumonia. He proposed that a committee, consisting of Drs. McClure and Jennings and Professor Seeley be appointed to make a series of scientific investigations in relation to the Rinderpest, and if it is proved that no such disease exists, and that it is simply pleuro-pneumonia, the public should be offi-cially informed of the fact as soon as possible. Dr. McClure gave as his opinion that there is not a single case of Rinderpest on the continent

of America. Dr. Kennedy thought that the cattle disease in Montgomery county had been greatly magnified. He thought that the letters written by Dr. Corson to Dr. Worthington, of West Chester, in which it is claimed that the Binderpest exists in that county, have been misrepresented. Dr. Corson's letters related merely to pleura pneumonia

The meeting, after some little discussion, passed the following resolution:—

Resolved, That this Society has no information which would justify the belief that there exists among the cattle of our country any greater amount of disease than usual. Neglect of sanitary regulations and certain local causes produce at all times diseases among men and beasts. It is unwise to confound these resuits of evident causes with the great scourge now afflicting the cattle of England.

That, nevertheless, it is highly proper that unusual precautions should be taken to keep our animals in strong health, and to prepare, as best we can, against further danger.
After some further remarks the meeting adjourned.
