THE PHILADELPHIA COUNTY PRISON.-The Nineteenth Annual Report of the Board of Inspectors of the Philadelphia County Prison has been sent to the Legislature. From this report it appears that during 1855 the total number of commitments was 16,142, or 2175 more than in 1364. Of the whole number, 11, 108 were white males, 4438 white females, 681 colored males, and 661 colored females, making a total of 16,888, to which add 275 who were in prison December 31, making the grand total for the year 12,162, 11. the year, 17,163. During the year, 18,381 were discharged, leaving 782 in the prison, December 31st, 1865, of whom 350 were convicts to hard labor. Of the whole number, 6508 were received for trial, 1035 were vagrants; 8880 were charged with disorder and breaches of the peace. Of those convicted during the year, 453 were amtended to hard labor; of these 101 were 20 years and under, and 175 from 20 to 30 years; 181 had learned a trade and 184 had no trades; 84 could not read and 248 could both rend and write; were moderate drinkers, 144 temperate, and 102 intemperate. Or the 15,142 commitments, 6751 were discharged by the committing magistrates, and 264 were ignored by the Grand Jury. Of the 9915 commuments for vagrancy, drunkenness, and disorderly conduct, 5815 were discharged by the Inspectors before the expiration of the term of commitment. The actual cost to the city for the maintenance of the prison during the year was Son 202 33. The physician's report attached states that the number requiring treat-ment during the year was 2007; of these, 1936 recovered or much improved, 42 died, and 29 remained under treatment. The ratio of mortality was ewenty-five hundredths of one per cent., or 42 deaths out of a population of 16,283.

The prisoner was followed to New York, where he was arrested at the Ma-rine Barracks by Officers Nutt and Berry, of the Second Police District. He was brought to this city and sant to prison on Saturday algae.

A colored man, named Harrison Higgins, employed as head waiter at the United States Hotel, had a hearing before Alderman Beitler yesterday afternoon, charged with committing an assault upon Charles Howell, a boy, aged ten years, the son of Mr. Bradley A. Howell. Mrs. Caroline Isageson testified that on last Satorday evening the lad was seated at a table in the dining room, and was placing some sugar on a piece of bread, when the prisoner stepped up, and pulling the chair from under him, threw him on the floor. He then caught hold of him, and walked him out of the room. The defendant was bound over to answer the charge

The purchaser of the potatoes accompanied the farmer in his wagon, and when he reached the Farmers' Market the stranger got out, stating that he was going in the market to pay a bill. He remained a few moments and returned to the farmer, stating that he lacked six dellars of the amount required. The money was loaned to him, and that was the last the farmer saw of his money or the purchaser of the potatoes.


