A controversy ensued, when, acting true to his brutal instincts, he assaulted and knocked her down. He was arrested last night, and placed in one of the cells at the Central Station, but still found an opportunity to indulge in his favorite pastime of displaying his muscle on un-offending parties, for he was placed in the same cell with a German, with whom he speedily picked a quarrel, and his last operation was to tear off his boots, and using them on the body of the said German, knocked him down, and mullated him. He was committed on the several charges in the sum total of \$1000, having had hearings before Alderman Beitler and White.


