-The town of Newport, Maine, has cleared off all its debts, and has now a balance of assets of \$5022.55. The people had courage enough last year to assess a tax of ten per cent, upon themselves.

-The Rockingham (Va.) Register states that a company of Baltimoreans have bought a tract of mineral lands consisting of forty thousand acres, in Giles and Bland counties, Virginia, for the sum of one hundred thousand dollars.

-The Sandusky (Ohio) Register says the re-ceipts of fish at that place amount to from five to eight tons per day. When navigation opens the receipts will not be less than forty tons per day during the entire season.

-In Boston the value of real estate is daily augmenting, not only by sales, but by the great activity prevailing among architects and build-cis, and the vast number of projects for improv-ing buildings by remodelling.

-A Russian engineer has discovered an extensive coal-field about ninety versis from Tur-kestan. The coal is said to be of excellent quality, and the Russians will now be able to carry out their plan of establishing a fleet of steamers on the Syr Daria, which has hitherto proved impracticable in consequence of the want of fuel in those parts.

-The literature of craniology is accumulating. Mr. Greenwell is about to issue, in London, "A Decade of Skulls from Ancient Northumbria," containing ten lithographic plates, each giving one view of a skull, half size, and two other views, quarter size, together with a detailed account of the circumstances under which each was found, with wood-cuts of urns and other associated objects.

-The Independance Belge complains that at a recent substeur dramstic performance at Brus sels for an English charity, which was attended by a mixed audience of English and Belgians, the English insisted on all standing, uncovered, while "God save the Queen" was being played, and then put on their hats and hurried out noisily when the band struck up "La Brabanconne," the national air of Belgium

-The editor and printer of a paper called the Gazetie de l'Industrie have been just sentenced by the Paris police court to a month's imprisonment each, and three hundred francs fine, and the suppression of the paper has been ordered, for having introduced political topics into their commercial articles in order to explain the varia-tions of the Bourse and of trade in general. The paper, it seems, was not authorized to treat political topics, and it had lodged no caution money.

-A genuine case of trance is reported from Guildford, England. An old lady, after being for a long time in a low state of health, sank down suddenly, and was pronounced by a sur-geon to be dead. The cofin was purchased, and the body put into it, but it is said that just as the undertakers were about to screw down the lid the supposed corpse started bolt upright, to the great terror of the bystanders, and, getting out of its could, walked across the room. It is added that," the old lady is now hale and strong.'

-The Boston Transcript says that a survey for a railroad around and over the Hoosac Moun-tain has been completed, and estimates made by which it is computed that instead of tunnelling the mountain, the State may relinquish the tun-nel to the 'Trey and Greenfield Company, and proceed to build the new road for a much less amount of money than has already been sunk in the bore. It is said that the road over the mountain could be completed within a year. The plan contemplates going nearly to the top of the mountain, and then by switches making a detour of five miles.

-The Detroit Tribune mentions the final settlement of a case that was in court over three hundred years. About the year 1560 August Troutwein, living in the northern part of Ger-many, loaned a sum of money to Count Mansfield, who died without paying the debt. Nearly field, who died without paying the debt. Nearly all the claims were confested by the heirs of Count Mansfield, and the whole estate, being in-debted to a great extent, was put under seques-tration, and has ever since been under the ad-ministration of the Prussian Government. 
