ANOTHER PRILADELPHIA INSTITUTION .-The collowing act to incorporate the Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, has passed to a second reading, and will shortly be made a law by our State Legislature:-Whereas, it is deemed advisable and proper to

erect a building in the city of Philadelphia for the purpose of affording accommodations for corpora-tions, institutions, and individuals, for the promotion of the general commercial interests of said city,

Therefore, Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby chacted by the authority of the same, I hat James A. tion shall deem advisable
Section 3. That a general meeting of the stockholders of the said corporation shall be held annually
for the election of President, Treasurer, and eight Managers, and for the transaction of other business: the officers so elected (excepting the Preasurer) snall constitute a Board of Directors, and shall have power to fail vacancies that may occur therein, and shall continue in office until their successors are elected; but it such meeting or election shall not take place at the time appointed, the corporation shall not for that cause be dissolved, but such meeting or election shall take place as soon thereafter as may be practi-cable: Provided, That one week's public notice thereof be first given in three or more daily news-papers published in the city of Phitadelphia. Section 4 That the corporation shall have such powers only as shall be proper and conveniest for the holding, constructing using, and beneficially at the time appointed, the corporation shall not for

the holding, constructing thing, and beneficially enjoying the property hereinbefore referred to, and the income and proceeds thereof, and until other officers shall be du y elected, the persons named in the first section of this act shall be held to be the managers of the said corporation, and shall have

power and authority as such. Section 5. That at all meetings of steckholders the representatives of one third of the whole amount of the capital stock of said corporation shall constitute thecapital stock of said corporation shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and the stockholders present, either in person or by proxy, shall be entitled to one vote for each share of stock held by them, and they shall have power to emact by-laws for the government of the said corporation:

DOOM OF THE MURDERER-THE DEATHwarrant Kean to Christian Berger.—Yester-day Mr. Sheriff Henry C. Howell, accompanied by ex Sheriff William H. Kern, and Sheriff's Attorney J. E. Salter, visited the Moyamensing Prison, and read the death-warrant recently signed by Governor Curita to Christian Berger, the murderer of Miss Mary L. Watt, of German-

When the Sheriff and his friends entered the when the Sherin and his friends entered the apartment the prisoner was standing near the window, and tooking through its bars. He turned carelessly around, and extending his right hand to the Sherin, said, in a sullen manner and low tone of voice:-

How do you do?" "Do you know me, Berger?" replied the

"Yes, I remember seeing you here once before," responded the prisoner. The latter now glanced at the remainder, of the party, then placed his foot on a small bench and bowed his head down-

The Sheriff produced the death-warrant, and

"Mr. Berger, I have come this morning for the purpose of performing an exceedingly un-pleasant duty. I have with me your death-war-rant, signed by the Governor of this Common-wealth, fixing the time of your execution on the 27th day of April ensuing, between the hours of 10 and 2 o'clock. The prisoner looked up and said:—

"Yes, I have heard of it; yesterday my father was here, and he communicated the fact to me." The Sheriff then proceeded in a calm, dignified, and solemn manner, and in a voice slightly tremulous, to read the document that doomed the prisoner to an ignominious death. During this time Berger retained the same position; he was callous, almost like a breathless statue; he was not affected in the least; not the slightest emotion was apparent. The reading having been concluded, the Sheriff broke the silence by saying to the doomed convict that he did not consider there was the slightest hope for a par-don; not even for a respite. He advised him to prepare to meet his fate, assuring him that he need not entertain any hope of executive

Berger replied:—"My only hope now is in Jesus. My spiritual adviser, the Rev. Mr. Hamden, has paid me several visits lately, which I have enjoyed very much." Ex-Sheriff Kern asked him if there was any-

thing he was in want of.

The prisoner replied in the negative, and added that he "enjoyed all the comforts he could reasonably expect under the circum-

Inquiry was then made if his wife had been to see him recently, to which he replied that "she had been there one day during the past week for the last time."

Sheriff Howell again orged him to make preparation for his fate, desiring to impress upon his mind the certainty of death. Berger made no reply. He snook hands with the Sheriff and Mr. Kern, and thus the interesting ceremonies were ended. The prisoner was

left alone in his cell The gallows will be crected upon the same spot where other murderers were hung. This is located in the western part of the yard, about midway between the wall and the rear of one of the wings of the prison. The rope is already made; it is made of the best hemp, and is about

ave-eighths of an inch in diameter.

Already the Shoriff has been beset by many persons who desire passes to witness the execution; but he has expressed a firm determination to adhere strictly to the law in regard to its requirements. The newspapers will be well represented upon this occasion, so that the public will be enlightened as to the scenes and circumstances attending the execution.

THE NEW ODD FELLOWS' TEMPLE.-It is well known to our readers that the independent Order of Odd Fellows have had, for some time, in contemplation the erection of a magnificent Temple for the especial use of the Order. A convention for this purpose has held several meetings, and have authorized a committee to apply for a charter of incorporation. The plan agreed upon for raising the means to build is an excellent one, but the plan suggested for raising the new hall is decidedly objectionable. It is proposed to have no stores, no lecture-room, and

no saloons in the new edifice.

These are all much needed in and out of the Order, and would yield a revenue sufficient to defray the immense expense of the new temple, and hence this action of the Convention meets hall for lectures in the central portion of our city is now in constant demand. Many of our leading scientific and literary associations would pay rents for the use of such a ball on stated evenings. Unless these adjuncts are placed in the new Temple, the rent of lodge rooms must be placed at a very high figure, to raise a revonue sufficient to defray the expenses of the building, without attempting to pay the interest

on the capital invested. The charter of the Association now before the Legislature is substantially as follows: — Henry Hopkins, D. S. Grissinger, Ezra B. Pratt, Christian Young, A. McNutt, Philip Lowry, Jr., and John G. Money are to be corporators and a Board of Managers for the Association. The last two named gentlemen have not the sauction of the Convention for their appearance as cor-porators. The capital stock of the Association shall not exceed \$250,000, divided into 50,000 shares. Section fourth says that the management of the property shall be under the direction of a board of seven managers, who shall be elected by ballot from among the stockholders, and this board shall elect a President, Secretary, and Treasurer, and fill any vacancy that may occur in the Board, adopt by-laws, and transact all business. This section ignores alike the Convention, the Order, and the enacted law. It is contrary to the wish and action of every delegate to the Temple Association according to expressed epision and vote.

Of course there is no chance f r the final passage of such a charter through the Legislature. The opposition to it would be general. We only make these statements so that the twelve thousand Odd Fellows in Philadelphia may be well informed relative to the proposed charter, which it passed, would be the constitutional and organic inw of the Odd Fellows' Temple Association.
