THE GUERILLA ATTACK ON THE BELGIAN EMBASSY, CITY OF MEXICO, March S,-The Belgian embassy took leave or their Majosties has evening and lett yesterony by difference for Vera Cruz, in order to take passage in the North American packet of the 8th instant. Unfortunately, before the diligence had arrived at Rio Frio, it was stopped by a band of brigands. The members of the Belgian, mission, who were accompanied by three or four soldiers within and outside the velocie, took immediate steps to depend themselves, whereupon the brigands skedaddled with precipitate haste, not before they had fired one voiles, by which Captain D'Huar, and General Foury and two other persons were killed. The same evening notice of the occurrence

was received in Mexico City, and his Majesty the Emperor set out with a French escort for

Yert rday morning at eight o'clock, according to previous announcement, the funeral services for the soul of Baron D'Huart were performed in the Church of St. Fieronimus. A detachment of Baleian injuntry formed guard mide ment of Belgian inlantry formed guard inside the church, and the band of their regiment exc cuted some splendin funeral music in one of the side sistes, close to the vestry.

Their Majesties the Emperor and Empression

assisted at the sad ceremonies, as also the Minis ter for Foreign Affairs, the President of the Academy, Don Fernando Ramirez, some lew persons belonging to the Court and Governmen the personnel of the Beigian Legation, and a great number of French Austrian, and Beigian generals and officials. The percurones commenced at half-past eight.

Buenaver tura Sarabia has been made Imperial Commissary of the Sixth Territorial Division. D. J. M. Ir barren has been made imperial Commissery of the Eighth Territorial Division. Gene ral Gamboa has been made a member of the Multary Council, and charged with the organization of the army. He is announced as a member of the Order of Guadaloupe. General D. Severo del Castillo is announced as com-mander of the Fourth Military Division; General commander of the Fifth Division General Cassanova, commander of the Seventh Division, and General Gutlerrez, commander of the Eighth Division.

DEATH OF A YOUNG LADY-FIVE OTHER PERSONS

PROSTRATE. A whole family living in Westchester county were recently poisoned. The particulars, as far

as we have them, are as follows:-A few days ago, the family of Uriah Tompkins, a justice of the peace of the town of Greenburg, Westchester county, after partaking of a meal at their house in Tarrytown, became very ill, with all the symptoms of arsenical poison The family consisted of Mr. Tompkins, his wife. and four children. The eldest of these, a daugh ter of nineteen years of age, has since died; and the others are in a very critical condition. or two of them, it is reported, will not be likely to recover. Their flesh is horribly swollen, and are growing worse and weaker

All the food that remained in the house was sent to this city for chemical examination, with

what result is not yet stated. No traces of the poison, and no facts in regard to the manner or cause by which it was communicated to the food, could be ascertained at the house of Mr. Tompkins. Some persons believe that criminals to whom the Justice had become obnoxious were prompted to the deed by revenge; but this is a mere suspicion. The facts will doubtless be explained when the investiga-tions in regard to the food are complete.—N. Y.

INTERESTING ITEMS.

SUCCLES OF THE "JOHNSON" PARTY. - The "Johnson" party is in the ascendant at Nabant, Massachusetts. At the recent town meeting the following officers were elected:—Moderator, David Johnson; Town Clerk, A. D. Johnson; Selectmen and Assessors, W. H. Johnson, E. B. Johnson, C. Harvey Johnson; Treasurer and Collector, W. W. Johnson; School Committee, Franklin E. Johnson, Walter Johnson, George . Johnson was also appointed a Constable.

PRIZE MONEY .- In a few days the Fourth Auditor of the Treasury will disburse to the officers and crew of the United States steamer Mattern and others, prize money amounting to \$35,000, accruing from the sales of the captured vessels Stay and Charlotte, The crew of the James Adger will receive over \$100,000 as prize money for the capture of the late Rebel vessel R. E. Lee.

A Masonic Tearle.—The different Masonic Lodges of Brooklyn, numbering about twenty, have decided to erect a temple for Masonic uses, Several sites have been offered for the purpose of erecting a suitable building, but thus far none has been selected. It is probable that arrange ments will soon be completed to build a structure which will not only be an ornament to the city, but a credit to the fraternity.

FIRE AT NEW HAVEN .- Quite a fire occurred on Tuesday night, about midnight, in the large frame dwelling-house in George street, New Haven. The building was wholly destroyed, with most of its contents. It was occupied by several families, but toriunately all the in-mates escaped unburt, although they were turned out of house and home on a very uncomfortable night.

CLEMENT C. CLAY, -A Washington correspondent explains that Clement C. Clay is confined at Fortress Monroe on the charge of advising and being accessory to the raiding piots con-cocted in Canada during the war. A considera-ble portion of his correspondence on this subject is in the possession of the Government, and some of it may be published soon.

A NEW INSURANCE PROJECT. - The latest novelty is a Boiler Insurance Company, which it is said is now forming in New York on the plan of the Manchester (England) Boiler Association. It is proposed to insure against all losses arising from the failure of boilers under the inspection of the company.

FIRE IN THE WOODS, —A fire broke out in the woods on the farm of Mr. Charles Trivillian, in New Kent county, Va., on Tuesday week, and raged for three days, sweeping during that time over a number of farms, among which was the White House tract, and destroying several barns and a large amount of fencing

NORTH CAROLINA SHAD .- We are glad to see the signs of a successful ashing season in North Carolina. On Saturday the Seaboard road brought down some 200 barrels of shad. They took the boat for Baltimore that night. - Norfolk

A YOUTHFUL MAYOR, -John L. Flagg, Esq., just elegted Mayor of Troy. N. Y., is the youngest incumbent of that office in the United States, being but twenty-lour years of age. He is a graduate of Harvard College, of the class of 1857.

FOREIGN ITEMS.

A JAPANESE PRESENT TO NAPOLHON, A valuable present from the Tycoon of Japan to toe Emperor Napoleon has reached Marseilles. It consists of no less than 15,000 cases of calleworns, the more prized inasmuch as it has been clearly proved that Japanese sik worns produce a superior quality of sik to those of any other country, and are, moreover, less liable to the disease which has of late years caused so much distress to the sik growers of the South of France. The Protessor of Japanese of the Paris School of Oriental Languages, M. Leon Rosny, has been sent to Marseilles by the Government for the purpose of decephering the explanatory tickets which are affixed on each case. M. Rosny is accompanied by a young Japanese, by name Sagoura Gi, and by several of his pupils. who are to assist him in his work.

THE SCHEME FOR PAYING OFF THE NATIONAL Dens or Italy by means of voluntary contribu-tions continues to make way. Numerous offers are registered every day by the Gazette or the People, of Turin, but at present not a single crown in actual money has been called for—a more practical proposition is expected before that part of the work begins. Most of the promises are made by ready solvent persons, but there is something rather judicrous in anonymons offers, such as one recorded by a Floren-the correspondent of the Independence, "I con-firm my offer of 500,000 francs. A Venetian Emigrant," This is simply impossible, seeing that no one who could offer such a sum would be allowed to quit Venice.

THE POPE AND THE PROPHETS. - A few days ago it was reported that Pius IX had prophesied that he would have to leave Rome this year, return next year, and die the tollowing year. A correspondent in Bome thinks the Pope quite capable of making and attering such a forecast. No Pope has ever completed the twenty-third year or his Pontificate. If Pius IX should five till 1860 he would do so. But as no Pope has ever done so, he will not. Therefore he must die in 1868. But he has always talked of fresh persecutions, and about his being compelled to leave Rome once more. Again the Chnrch must triumph. Therefore he must return. There will be only time for all these necessities by leaving Rome this year. Therefore, etc.

THE "TRUCK OF GOD."-Dr. Manning has revived the singular medieval custom of the "Truce of God," for the benefit of the Irish members of his flock. In view of the riots and excesses which so frequently occur on St. Patrick's day, the Archbishop proposes "a truce in honor of St. Patrick," promising forty days' indulgence to all who accept this truce and keep

it. The promise is "to abstain from intoxicating liquors from 6 o'clock on Friday evening, th leth, to 12 o'clock on Sunday night, the 18th of March, and oder this act of mortification for the good of my soul, and to evert the anger of God so justly deserved on account of the sin of grunkenness.

THE MURDERER OF SIXTEEN WOMEN, -The examination of Philippe, the murderer of a woman in the Rue de la Ville l'Eveque, Paris, is now approaching its termination. Crime appears to have been a monomana with bim, and the inquiry has brought to light not less than sixteen murders committed by him on women; these live were in Algeria, three in Italy, and eight in France, and all by cutting their throats with a razor. He displays a remarkable cynicism, and on first entering the office of the examining tudge expressed his astonishment that he should not be permitted to smoke there,

THE CORDEN MEMORIAL.—The Manchester people have decided upon giving a very sensible form to their memorial of Mr. Cobden. After devoting £2500 to a statue, they "propose to endow the chair of political economy at Owen's College with £1250, on condition of one weekly lecture being delivered free to all primary school or pupil teachers residing in Manchester or Sal-The remainder of the fund of £4420 is to be invested as a prize fund for these teacher

RAILWAY ACROSS THE ANDES .- The construction of a railway from the Plate across the Andes to the Pacific is believed likely to be realized within the next ten years. Already 240 miles of the route are in course of rapid construction from the port of Rosario, on the river Plate, to the interior city of Cordova; and there can be little doubt that, with the progress of immigration and settlement, this one will be steadily extended.

EARL BRAUCHAMP.—By the death of the Earl of Beauchamp, the Hou. F. Lygon is raised to the House of Lords, where he will sit as the sixth earl, although the creation dates back only to 1816. The deceased earl was only thirty-six years of age, and his only brother, who succeeds

him, is one year younger. VICTOR HUGO, -The Solvil of Paris contains a writer from Victor Hugo, in which the veterau writer declines the offer made by the editor of £20,000 for his new work, "Les Travailleurs de la Mer," which he intended to publish in the shape of a fueilleton.

DEATH OF A WELL KNOWN BANKER. - The death is announced at Paris of the banker M. Louis Hottingner, He leaves two children, and property which is estimated at £2,400,000. Prince Couza is rich, and has valuable landed property in that part of Bessarubja which

Chunks from Montana.

From the St. Louis Disputch, March 17. We saw this morning some specimens of the indigenous products of Montana.
