-The death-rate of women is greater than that of men in Scotland. -The Astronomical Society of England has just issued eight views of the planet Mars. — General Prim is expected in Paris. So there is to be no new revolt in Spain under his leader-ship.

-At a recent sale in Berlin an autograph letter of Marie Anteinette was sold for the extraordinary sum of £295.

-Mr. William Thomas Brande, chemist of the Royal Mint, died at Tunbridge Wells, England, recently, aged eighty years. -Chiravari has a picture of the cholera, as a

horrible spectre, rousing the slumbering Inter-national Commission by a fierce attack. -General Warren is out in a pamphlet justifying his conduct in the Five Forks battle, for which, it will be remembered, he was removed from command by General Sheridan.

-A brigade of juvenile crossing-sweepers has been formed in London, under the presidency of Lord Brougham. At present there are eighteen boys, who wear a green blouse as their uniform. They are not to beg, but to trust to the liberality

-A triple marriage in one family took place recently at Lyons, France. The three couples, representing three generations, were united by the same priest; and at a ball in the evening, they figured in the same quadrille—father, son, and granddaughter, with their respective spouses.

-Bee-keepers will be glad to learn that M. Duchemin, a French chemist, after two years patient observation, has discovered the source of the parasite which attacks those insects. He has found the parasite on the flowers of the Hetianthus annus (the sun-flower), and on the bees, and he has proved conclusively that it gets upon the bee from the plant, and not upon the plant from the bee.

-The Protestant cemetery at Florence, Italy, is in danger of destruction by the proposed ex-tension of the city The present burial ground was not granted originally to the English, but to the Swiss, although it has long been used as a place of interment for Protestants of all countries. When it shall cease to be so used arrange ments will have to be made with the municipality for another Protestant cemetery.

-There is in the parish of Helmingham Suffolk. England, an ancient grave-field of human skele-tons. The todies are several hundred in number, lying in a thin layer of flint grave on the boulder clay of the district, within two feet of the present surface. They are placed very closely side by side upon their backs, with their feet to the east and heads to the west, and in a remarkable state of preservation. They are all supposed to date before the year 300.

-The "Societe des Gens de Lettres" of Paris, recently had a very stormy sitting. After the report on the situation of the society had been read, some of the members found ault with the "Tresor Littera re," a work edited by the society, on account of the Ultramontane tone of its articles. A memper of the committee, M. Michiels, went so far as to say that the committee purposely admitted the articles in question "in order to prepare the country for the return of the elder branch of the Bourbons." 
