
NEW PROPERTIES.

ENGAGEMENT OF THE NEW COURT. HOUSE FOR THE SEASON.

This exhibition came off last Thursday, as announced, to a very good house in the second story of Independence Hall, and the performancesiwere of a varied and interesting character. Myth Harpooning introduced an ordinance, although failing to give its name, declaring the consent of the Council, to a change in the location of the new Court House, so that the building may stand East and West, instead of North and South, as provided by the contract. The charge to turn the building around (in the brain of the architect we suppose, as the first stone is not laid) will be but soon dollars, and as the present contract only calls for four walls, and as when it is up they will want windows, and doors, and partitions, and perhaps a chimney, they had better turn the building, so as to change the contract and get these things in, as they will probably be wanted. They may as well be provided for now in connection with the change; besides; the building would look much handsomer fronting East and West than North and South, and as President Johnson is reconstructing the Union on the principle of no North and no South, so should we reconstruct our beautiful new Court House on the same principle. (Immense cheering.) Myth Van Cleaver said he was opposed to turning the building around, at the present time at least, let us get it up first and see how it looks, and if not hands some enough, then he would move to turn itaround. He thought the contractor had taken it too low, and he was in favor of making him build it too low-(cries of joke! joke!) -and teach him better than to take City Contracts too low again. 






THE NEW COURT-HOUSE TURNED TO PACE THE HEAVENS.
