The Naval Battle on the Chillan Coast-Official Accounts - Rejoicings of the People, Etc. CHILL.

The Naval Victory-The Fight at Abiao. Chili still remains the centre of public interest on this coast. The steamer of the 11th instant, from Valparaiso, brings confirmation of the re-ported victory of the ellied squadron over the Spanish frightes Villa de Madrid and Bianca. Flity-syc guns in the hands ot Peruvians and Chilleas proved more than a match for ninetycontest of two hours, in which diteen hundrad shots were exchanged, at the distance from one thousand to fifteen hundred yards, the Spanish vessels retired detented.

REPORT OF THE COMMANDER OF THE PERUVIAN DIVISION.

OR BOARD OF THE FRIGATE "APURIMAC " ON THE STATION OF CHAYAHUM, February 10.- fhe ailied squadron under my orders, consisting of the frigate Apurimae, the corvettes America and Union, belong-

Apurimac, the corvettes America and Union, belong-ing to Pero, and the steamer Covadonga, belonging to Chili, being anchored at this station, i was in-formed at 10 o'clock A. M., that in the contiguous channels two steamers were seen that in all proba-bility belonged to the Spanish squadron. I immediately gave orders to form a close line of combat, anchored and moored, and to make ready the engines of all the visuels, me uting the fright, notwillestanding that it was quite unserviceable, ac-cording to the report of the environers, owing to the damage of which I have already informed your Ex-cedence. We remained ready for action, establishdamage of which I have already informed your Ex-collency. We remained ready for action, establish-ing telegraphs in the places most favorable for ac-quainting us promptly of the approach of the enemy. In effect, at half-past 2 o'clock 1^o, M., two columns o' amoke could be distinctly discrimed over the island of Abtao, which indicates the approach of the Spanish vessels by the eastern channel or the said island, which is the widest. At half past three the Spanish fright Blanca ap-peared in the channel referred to, followed closely by the Villa de Madrid; and when at a distance of about fifteen hundred metres from our line the fright I commanded opened fire upon them, as also the other ships—a fire which was answered by the

the other shtps—a fire which was answered by the eremy in a spirited manner, but without being able to overcome our resistance; and, at last, forced by the damage we inflicted, went to take shelter in a The drinke we indicate which to the action of our line, from whence iney maintained a vertical fire. In this position, had the *Apavimac* been able to move, we should have issued out in line of battle to cut of their retreat— most probably with the most successful result. Shortly after the two frights left the crock, re-tring about without

thing slowly from the scene of compart without ocasing to fire upon our line, which being vigorously responded to, toreed them to retreat until sheitered from our shot by the northern point of the Island of Abtao, which is the most elevated, The enemy continued their retreat until, being out of range the firing consed which had lasted with

of range, the firing censed, which had lasted with out interruption two hours, and in which some fitteen hundred shots must have been fired by both

The damage suffered by our side is as follows:-The Apprimac received three balls in her hull on the water line, a shell, which destroyed her launch, which was moored astern, and another which carried away her funnel. The America received four balls in her hull, and

The America received four balls in her hall, and two more, which, flying high, cut away the main-mast abrouds and some rigging. The Union three, one of which entered by a port hole, killing two men who served the third gun and damaging the steam chest; and two others which fell upon the fashion pieces. It would be superfluous to mention to your Excellency the officers who were present at this engagement, as all, without excep-tion, did their duty. I am amply satisfied with the discipline, coolness, and courage displayed by all, including about forty men of the Naval Brigade of Vaboratiso, and thirty marines who were abipped at Valparaiso, and thirty marines who were shipped at the last moment in order to fill vacancies. As the course followed by the enemy's force after

the engagement was not known, and the night was at hand, and our ships were unprovided with pilots, it was not possible for the corvetor to go in pur-suit of them, for which reason I gave orders that sife should be sent out to reconneitre the nestion taken up by them. However, the recounsiting party found nothing but fragments of the frigates Villa de Madrid and Blanca such as the figure head of one of them, fragments of sides, ramrods, sponges, seamen's caps, etc. Notwithstanding that we were convinced of the stammac suffered by the spanish, and the slight tear we could entertain of a tresh sttack atter having reputsed them so gloriously, I maintained the force reprised them so providely, I maintained the force under my commandigat quarters until the 9th, when the Chinan corvete, the *Esmeratda*, arrived, the commander of which is at present the commander-in-chief of the allied forces, and whom I informed of what had command what had occurred. WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, April 2. The Negro Celebration at Richmond. To-day's National Republican says:-"There is

report that the Government here has interered with the proposed celebration by the colored people of Richmond of the anniversary of the fall of that city on the 3d instant. We have the best authority for saying that neither the President nor General Grant has interfered in the matter in any manner. The subject is entirely within the control of General Terry, who is a man of safe judgment, and being on the ground knows best what to do in the premises. He is authorized to act prudently in the

#### event of any unnecessary or illegal disturbance of the peace on either side." Important Protective Bill.

An important bill, defining the rights of national citizenship under the first clause of the second section of the fourth article of the Constitution, and punishing their violation as a crime, has been prepared by the Hon, Samuel Shellabarger, of Ohio, and will, if leave is obtained, be introduced into Congress to-morrow. The bill is designed to throw the protection of the nation over the loyal men of the South from other States, who are now being driven from that section. No law executing that clause in the Constitution has ever been passed, because no overwhelming necessity for it was felt before the war.

The first section declares the rights of national citizenship to be the right to go through and into, and to sojourn and reside, in each State and there to acquire, dispose of, and enjoy protection for person and property, to be exempt from unusual taxes, etc., and to have equal redress in the courts. The second section punishes the attempt to deprive a citizen of any of these rights by any manner of intimidation, but without violence. The third section punishes with death a murder committed in the attempt to deprive the cilizen of the right to go into, or through, any State, or of his right to abide or do basiness therein. The fourth section punishes

as a felony, manslaughter, or great bodily harm inflicted in attempting to deprive a citizen of any right secured by the bill. The fifth section

Circulation of the "Intelligencer."

On a recent exhibit of Washington papers which desired some printing from the City Councils, the Intelligencer only claimed 3800 daily circulation. This includes exchanges, the free list, and what they are temporarily circulating free in hope of gaining patrons. The advertising received from the Government would probably pay for its entire edition.

## Fractional Currency.

The fractional currency issued by the Printing Division of the Treasury Department for the three days ending on Saturday, amounted to \$228,582.50.

During the week ending March 31, shipments of fractional currency to New York and Philadelphia amounted to \$100,000 each; while the shirments to National Banks and private individuals were \$100,009'70.

#### National Banks.

There are now in operation 1647 National Banks, to which have been furnished \$264;-247,170 in national currency. The amount seued last week was \$1,430,800.

#### Disbursements of the Treasury.

The disbursements of the Treasury Department on account of the War, Navy, and Interior Departments for the month ending March 31 were as follows:--War, \$8,608,931; Navy. \$4,585,044; Interior, \$2,614,374. During the same period the repayments into the Tressury by these Departments were, by the War Depart ment, \$3,422,770; Navy Department, \$1,140,057; Interior Department, \$77,250.

## Brigadiers and their Emoluments.

The pay of brigadier-generals on duty in Washington is \$5435.75 cash, and forage worth \$834, or \$6269.77 per annum in money. It that same General goes into the field he gets \$1485.25 less. A bill is now before the Military Committee asking increased pay for Generals Meigs, Dyer, and Townsend of \$1214 per year each. making their pay \$7483-77. It will be reported upon adversely.

## cabinet Changes.

The air is again filled with rumors of Cabinet changes. This time they are confined to Secre taries Harlan and Stanton, both of whom, ac cording to ramor, are to be summarily removed if General Hawley is elected, and the Civil Rights bill is passed over the veto.

## From Fortress Monroe.

FORTRESS MONROE, March 31 .- The steamer Eulaw arrived from Norfolk to-day, having ob tained a supply of coal, and sailed for New York. The double turretted steamer Miantonomah, Commander J. C. Beaumont, arrived at the Norfolk Navy Yard yesterday, from Washington. She will fit out and be coaled here, and be conveyed to New York by the gupboat De Solo, now lying in this harbor.

Efforts will soon be made to repair the Dismal Swamp Canal, by parties in Norfolk. During the war it was much injured, and as the U.S. Covernment owns two-fifths of the work, it is presumed the sum of \$200,000 will be appropriated to aid in its reconstruction.

Canal shares are in fair demand. Lehigh Navigation sold at 524, no change; 21 was bid for Schuylkill Navigation common; 20 for preferred. do: 1141 for Morris Canal preferred: 124 for Susquehanna Canal: 45 for Delaware Division; and 59 for Wyoming Valley Canal.

The 5 per cent, loans were alike undisturbed in most cases. For mercantile paper the rates are unchanged. There is a little 7 per cent, paper making, and not much demand for it. The re-cent failure, which, as time passes, is shown to have been more serious than when just ap. have been more serious than when first an-nounced, has made lenders cautious, and safety rather than high rates for money is the rule. It is a fact beyond question that the banks of the country, as a whole, are too much expanded, and have as scentitics too many certificates re-presenting gold, coal, copper, and petroleam "enterprises," and railways of very doubtful value. Banks who do not court this class of traders have their pocket-books full of credits, placed on goods bought at high prices, to be sold at a loss, or have invested their funds too largely in Government stocks, which are not money, or loanable,'

-The Pottsville Miners' Journal of Saturday says:-"The quantity of coal sent by railroad this week is 60,167.05; by canal 36,834; for the week, 97,101'07 tons, against \$8,597 tons for the corresponding week last year. The shipments are heavy for the week, and prices rule low, in many instances below the cost of production for sizes. Of course this cannot continue some sizes. Of course this cannot continue long. The trade sums up this week as follows, compared with last year:-1865, 150,171; 1866, 177,767. Increase 27,596. Prices have declined a shade at the shipping ports since last week. This is caused by the large supply sent to mar-ket, which is in excess of a healthy demand. Coal is now selling as low as it did in the first year of the Rebellion. At the rates quoted it will not net to the operators here over \$2:50 to \$2:75 a ton. To-day I could not do so, because the two Spanish irigates continued crussing, both before and after the combat, in the neight orhood of the Island of Abtao. Neither could I do it by night, because they placed themselves at the mouth of the Chacao Channel, one at the north and the other at the south, with the intention of surprising us, tbinking, perhaps, that I should endeavor to take advantage of the darkness to attempt to join the allied squadron. At dawn I began to return, but on arriving near Remolinos I was met by Fing Lieutenant Wa ker, announcing to me that the irrates had not moved irom their positions, which obliged me to return to Ancud and remain there till 2 A. M., when I again began my return, which I was enabled

to effect without any mischance. On my arrival at the station I received the des-patches which I have the honor to transmit to your Excellency, and from which you will see that the two Spanish frigates have been repulsed; and their hurried retreat after such a sudden attack suggests the inference of a decided def-ar, as otherwise they would have returned to the attack
