#### AUSTRIA AND PRUSSIA.

WILLIAM TO STREET

Threatened Eupture Between the Two German Powers-Warlike Preparations.

Vienna (March 4) Journal of Frankfort, Military arrangements of the greatest importance, and portending an impending rupture between the two great German Powers, have been adopted by Austria. In a lew days you may expect to hear of the movement of a large Austrian force towards the Prussian frontier. An order for the concentration of 100,000 troops on the frontier of Silesia has al-ready been despatched from Vienna.

THE CRISTS APPROACHING.

Nevertheless we cannot but recognize that the situation is b coming very scrious. It is not the military preparations going on in Prussia and in Austria, nor the general agitation of Ge many, that fills us with this beliet, but we see that Herr Von Bismarck is succeeding more and more in gaining over King William to his pians. A fortught ago the King of Prussia still held aloof from the parties in his Cabinet, and, after having heard various opinions expressed in the Council of February 28, reserved his own judg-ment. It was, therefore, to be hoped that the Courts would remain agreed, notwithstanding the difference of the Cabiness, and that King William would con-fine with a fixed limits the Catilinian policy of Herr Von Bismarck. This hope has been violently dis-turbed since the King signed the decree of the 11th inst. relative to punishable acts against the sovereign power. It that dec.ee had emanated from General you manteufiel, it would have had less importance. General Von Manteufiel is the agent of the ministry, and might have been disavowed, but the King's decision is irrevocable. This measure is specially serious since it caims to be applicable to Holstein, over which the flag of Austria is flying, and over the administration of which commanders can have no authority, however the Gastom conven-tion may be interpreted. The ordinance of March 11 is worded as though there were no Austrian govtion may be interpreted. The ordinance of March II is worded as though there were no Austrian governor or general in Holstem, and as though that dachy were already a Prussian province. It is not the Prussian menistry which says this, it is the King himsell. Herr Von Bismarck's policy is thus ratified by the highest authority in the State. The Prussian Minister has obtained a victory that was deemed impossible. All the forces of Prussia are hencelorth at the disposal of Count Von Bismarck. It is this which invests the situation with so much gravity. In the present state of things, it is scarcely doubtful that if the Cabinet of Vienna rejects, as it must, the ordinance of Marcla II, the coup de main against Hoistein point is no longer possible. The coup de main against Holstein would be war—war in which not only all Germany, but, in all probability, other countries, would be involved. At the first cannonabot the people of Germany would enter the lists, and not for Herr Von Bismarck. This war would not only be a struggle for proponderance; it would lead to the radical transformation of Germany. The power which disposes of thrones and nations may perhaps have chosen a Prussian country squire to light up this immense conflagration destined to purity Germany. But we still hope that, in reflecting upon the calamities which must result from such a conflict, the Prussian Government will, at the last ing upon the calamities which must result from such a conflict, the Prussian Government will, at the last noment, alter its views.

Military Preparations for the Conflict. Vienna (March 17) Correspondence of London Times. Although the results of the military conterences, which have just been held here, are kept from the knowledge of the public, it is a patent fact that preparations for war are being made in all parts of the empire. In order that there may be no unnecessary out ay, the men on furiough will be allowed to remain where they are until their services allowed to remain where they are until their services are required; but they have received instructions to be prepared to join their respective regiments at a day's notice. It is not likely that a large army of observation will be posted in Bohemia, as considerable detachments of troops are being placed en echelon in the vicinity of the various railway stations. The officers who had leave of absence have received orders to join their regiments immediately, and all of them seem to be eager for the approaching tray, though they are well aware that the Frussian a tillery is superior to their own. The Austrian cavalry is magnificent, and should an opportunity present itself, it will hardly fail to render good service.
