Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That Colkin Colke, George W. Cass, George C. Franciscus, Geo. W. Ford, William H. Mirray, James D. Wetham, John A. Brown, Samuel A. Miller, James Werk, John B. Given, John K. Lee, Adam Warthman, Robert F. Taylor, D. S. Dengler, Robert Laughlin, and their associates, their successors and assigns, be and they are hereby incorporated and made a cody politir in law, by the name, style, and title of the North American Express Company, for the purpose of transacting a general express business in the North American Express Company, for the purpose of transacting a general express business in the transportation and forwarding of merchandise, goods, moneys, notes, papers of value, and any and all kinds of puckages and parcels to any and all places in the United States, when thepame shall not be contraband of war, and the said corporation shall continue for the space of twenty years from the research of the set.

Section 2. The said corporators, or any five of them, are hereby authorized to open books and receive subscriptions to the capital stock of the said company, which capital stock shall consist of one hundred thousand dollars, divided into shares of fifty dollars each, with authority to increase the same because from time to lime to an amount not

same hereaster, from time to time, to an amount not exceeding one million of dollars.

Section 3. The business of said company shall be transacted by a Board of Directors, who shall be ecceed annually by the stockholders, at such time and place as may be designated in the by-laws; the said Board of Directors shall elect, from among their numbers a President. Secretary and Transactor. number, a President, Secretary, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be prescribed by the by-laws, which the said board are hereby authorized to establish: Provided, That they shall not conflict with the Constitution of the United States, or the provisions

of this act.
Sect on 4. That there shall be annual meetings of the stockholders held at such piaces and times as may be designated in the by-laws, and that each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for every stare or stock he may hold of the Company.

Section 5. This corporation shall pay into the State treasury a bonus of one-half of one per cent, on the capital stock hereby authorized or hereafter

CHASE AFTER RIVER PIRATES .- An exciting httle incident occurred yesterday after-noon on the Delaware river, between Gloucester and Cooper's Points, involving a little bit of river piracy—a small chase and subsequent cap-ture of four river pirates by the Harbor Police. It appears that four men, named John J. Brown, Robert Hughes. William Lewis, and James Dorrance got into a sail-boat, and after cruising about a while, boarded a schooner which was lying at anchor off Gloucester Point, and finding the coast clear, proceeded to ransack the cubin for valuables. Three coats, some ship's stores, and a silver-mounted revolver were brought to light by said investigating committee, which were transferred to the sall-boat, her canvas spread, and she glided off up the river, bearing the pirates and their booty on her deck.

The captain of the schooner soon became aware of what had taken place, and quickly getting a yawl-boat manned gave chase to the miniature pirate. It was muscle against the fresh spring zephyrs; the pirate, fanned by the latter, sped briskly through the rippled waters, and the men in the pursuing craft sweated at and manfully pulled at the teathered oar. The race be came exciting. The Harbor Police boat hove in sight when the pursuit was at its height, and was immediately hailed by the coatless and re-volverless captain. The status of things was made known to the city government craft, when that vessel joined in the chase. After considerable ground, or rather water, had been gone over, the piratical craft was overhauled opposite Cooper's Point, and the Quixotic Captain Kidds were handed over to the authorities of Jerseyland, and the stolen articles recovered.

PRIVATE BOXES SECURED. - John Mc-Bride and John Kelley were arrested this morning, charged with the larceny of a number of boxes from the front of wholesale stores on Mar ket street. It appears that recently a large number of boxes have been spirited away from the fronts of various stores on Market street. This morning at an early hour the men mentioned above, were caught carrying off boxes from before John B. Meyers & Co.'s auction store, on Market street. They were arrested, their residences searched, and a quantity of boxes found on different parts of the premises, which had evidently been stolen. The party were committed by Alderman Godbou.

A DARING AND IMPUDENT ROBBERY .-The dwelling of Charles Reynolds, situated at No. 963 Warnock street, was entered at a very early hour this morning by the front door, which had been leit unfastened. Mr. Reynolds was not home at the time, and the thief or thieves very deliberately proceeded to the chamber of Mrs. Reynolds, where that lady and her children were last asleop. The room was quietly and quickly ransacked, and two boxes carried off which contained \$130 in money, a silver watch and chain, and a quantity of jeweiry. The Passover.—This Hebrew testival, which was instituted by Moses in commemoration of the Israelites remaining intact on the night of the destruction of the first-born in Egpyt immediately preceding the exedus from that country, is about closing, this being the seventh day of the Passover.

This season was originally observed by sacrificing passover lambs towards the evening of the 14th of the first Hebrew spring month, and eating them on the following night, as well as excluding all liver from the meals of that evening and the following seven days, the first and last

cluding all liver from the meals of that evening and the following seven days, the first and last of which were observed as holy.

Since the final destruction of Jerusalem the Passover has been celebrated by cating unleavened bread during the seven days of abstinence from labor on the first and last, and by the observance of the first evening of various domestic rites commemorative of the deliverance from Egyptian bondage, including the reance from Egyptian bondage, including the re-cital of Scriptural and legendary parratives, and familiar conversation on the same national event, and the chanting of psalms.

On the seventh day of the Passover the Songs of Moses in the Pentateuch are sung.

To-morrow being the eighth day will close this

interesting season. This morning in all the synagorues of the city appropriate services were held, and the attendance was large, old and young uniting in grateful adoration to God, the giver of all blessings.

morning on the commemoration of the Passover, in the synagogue in Seventh street, near Cherry. His remarks were listened to with strict atten-There are in this city two Portuguese, three German, and one Low Dutch synagogues; also the "Reformed Temple."
