CITY INTELLIGENCE

[For Additional City Intelligence see Eighth Page.] FORGERY CASE. - Samuel Watt, who offered a forged check [for \$2562.50, purporting to have been drawn by James Riley, at the banking-house of Messrs. Drexel & Co., on Thursday, was

arrested early yesterday morning, at his dence, in the upper part of the city, and had a hearing before Recorder Eneu.

James Riley, keeper of a public house at No. 134 South Eighth Freet, testified that the defendant frequents his place, and that the signa-ture to the check was not genuine. Charles N. Robinson, in the office of Drexel & Co., identified the defendant as the presenter of the check which he said was alled up in the office after it was ascertained what amount was required to obtain \$2000 in gold. Defendant was told to go to the Commercial Bank, on which the check was drawn, and get the money, instead of which he returned in a few minutes, with it marked "good." This did not satisfy Mr. Robinson, and while one of the clerks went to the bank to make inquiry of the Paying Teller, the man left the office. O. C. Montgomery, Paying Teller of the Commercial Bank, testified that the mark "good" on the check was not done by him. Jo-seph Walz, grocer, testified that he advanced twenty-five dollars on a sixty dollar check to the defendant, which purported to have drawn by James Collins, of Spring Garden

Mr. Collins testified that the check was a forgery. James Riley was recalled, and testified that a promissory note, with his signature to it, found in the possession of Watt, was a forgery. Watt was asked if he had anything to say to the charges, and he replied that he did not write the signatures to the checks, but he declined to say who did it. He was held to ball to answer.

CONDUCTOR IN TROUBLE .- A conductor of the Union Passenger Railroad, named G. W. Schiect, has been arrested on the charge of passing counterfell currency. One of the witnesses, Mr. Terwilger, said that he rode in one of the cars of the Union line to the Kensington depot. The conductor gave him change for ; quarter, and in so doing gave five counterfelt three cent notes and three pennies. It was said that the accused also passed five counterfelt three cent notes. Mr. McGrath, the President of the road, on being made acquainted with the fact, determined at once to investigate the matter. He requested Mr. Terwilger to ride once more, which was done, when another counterfeit three cent note was given, when the arrest followed. When taken into custody other counterfeit notes were found on his person. He was required to furnish bail to answer at Court.

MAKING THIEVES,—The detectives yesterday brought before Recorder Eneu two persons, named Frederick B. Honey and Jacob Haines. They keep a junk shop in Parrish street, near Ninth. The Germantown Railroad Company have been much annoyed by the their of metal, brass boxes, bolts, couplings, and other paraphernalia of their rolling stock. A large amount of it was discovered at and re-covered from the shop of the accused. With all the vigilance that could be exercised, the ever attentive Superintendent, Mr. Wilson, has been unable to discover the manner in which the property disappeared. The defendants in the present case were held for trial on a charge of receiving all the property with guilty knowledge.

REBUILDING THE TRACK.-The Girard Avenue Railway is now leased by the Fourth and Eighth streets company. Under the superintendence of the latter the whole track is being rebuilt. All the road bed is being removed and new foundations laid. The ties and sleepers are to be replaced with new timbers, and the old rails renewed. The rails of the Girard Avenue Railway were of a peculiar pattern, with curved flanges. The heavy wheels of the steamers and drays broke the flanges, and the frost cracked them, until the rails along the entire route were almost destroyed. New rails of the ordinary pattern are now being laid, and the work is pushing forward with unwonted speed.

A NEW PILOT BOAT .- At the ship-yard of Mr. J. W. Lynn, foot of Reed street, may be seen a pretty little clipper, built for a Delaware pilot boat, with a shape that bids fair to make her one of the fleetest of her craft. She is nearly finished, and will be launched early next week. Her cabin accommodations will be for eight or ten persons, and will be the best that can be provided. She is to be called the Henry Cope, after one of our most prominent shipping chants. Her dimensions are:-Length, 85 feet; beam, 20 feet 6 inches; hold, 8 feet. She is owned by Captain Harry Virden and others.

FOUND DROWNED .- An unknown white man was found drowned yesterday, off Smith's dock, in the Delaware, between Race and Vine dock, in the Delaware, between kace and vine streets. The body lacks an arm, and is supposed to be that of a returned soldier. It was dressed in army blouse and pants, white over and under-shirts, and low shoes, with dark moustache and hair. The appearance of the body indicates maceration of at least sixty days. Its height is five feet nine inches; the apparent age thirty years.

HIGHWAY ROBBERY.—About 1 o'clock yesterday morning, as Peter Knecht was walking in the neighborhood of Vine and Thirteenth streets, he was met by a man who asked him the time of night. He drew out his watch, when the thier at once snatched it from him and ran off. Pursuit was given, but the rogue proved too fleet of foot, and made his escape.

PROBABLE INFANTICIDE.—The body of a white male child, about three weeks old, was found on a lot at Second and Morris streets yesterday morning. It was taken to the Third Ward Station House. Coroner Taylor held an inquest upon it.


