Important Inter-State Decision by the Supreme Court of New Jersey. The following is the abstract of a case decided

in the Supreme Court of New Jersey at the term of February, 1866 :-Barnes & Drake vs. Gibbs and others.-The plain-Barnes & Brake vs. Gibbs and others.—The plaintiffs sued the defendants in the Supreme Court of the State of New York for certain moneys which it was alleged they had collected.
