CULVERTING COHOCKSINK CREEK .- The Chief Engineer and Surveyor has prepared a report showing the necessity of culverting Coocksink creek, from Front street eastward to the Delaware river. He says it is not only necessary for the benefit of the immediate neighborhood of the creek, which is now a noisome ditce, the emanations from which pol-late the atmosphere for a great distance from its immediate course, but from the fact that it is impossible to prevent the accumulation of deposit in it, thus raising its level above that of the two large arterial sewers emptying into it, and reducing their capacity fully one-half; it is the cause of frequent floodings at the low points upon these main sewers, subjecting the residents to great loss, which the city is continually being called upon and required, by results of suits at law, to reimburse. The sewer to be built will be about 1700 feet long, 830 feet of which will have to be a double sewer, 111 feet in diameter; 870 feet of the sewer will have to be 16 feet in diameter. A culvert, 4 feet in diameter, from Laurel street, eastward on creek, a distance of 1300 feet, will also be required. The entire cost of the work will be about

The Engineer in his report refers to projects for the improvement of the drainage of the area delivering into the Cobocksink. He says "that at Third and Culvert streets, and St. John's and Beaver streets, are two points subject tinued overflow." It is proposed to provide for these by changing the location of sewers somewhat, and turning the flow from Parrish street upon Culvert street into Beaver street at Fourth; thence by Beaver and Otter streets to the Ger mantown avenue. The flooding at Tenth and Parrish streets could be prevented, says the Chief, by constructing a sewer upon Brown street, westward from Franklin to Twelfth street, thus intercepting the drainage from the area south of Brown street. The cost of these sewers would be about \$25,000.

THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.-The steamer belonging to the Northern Liberty Hose Company has been thoroughly repaired, and at a trial last week a stream was thrown 270 feet, through a 17 inch nozzle. The water was drawn. from the river.

A NEW COLLEGE.-The Hicksite branch of the Society of Friends are about to erect a new building for college purposes. The locality selected for the building is Westdale Station, on the Media Railroad. It adjoins the venerable college in which the artist, Benjamin West, first drew breath. The completion of the edifice will require two years. It will cost \$200,000. The brick will be burned on the spot. Though its completion is somewhat remote, it will be under roof before the frosts of the coming autumn chill the laborers engaged in its construction. The drawings exhibited show a building that would do credit to any association what ever. A main building of 168 by 68 feet is flanked on either side by wings, which in turn terminate in handsome buildings 96 by 44 feet in dimensions. The plans provide for a perfec and faultless structure, into which every modern improvement is introduced, and whose light and ventilation are furnished upon the most approved and scientific principles. The drawings show a building whose dome in the centre is 120 feet high, and the whole will be constructed in a style at once substantial and picturesque.

Now, therefore, Section 1. The Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelphia do ordain. That for the purpose of cleansing the streets, lancs, and alleys of the city, it shall be divided into two districts, viz:—All south of Marke street, including Marzet street and West Philadelphia, to be called the Southern District; all north of Market street to be called the Northern District; and that the Mayor of the city be, and he is hereby authorized and directed to enter into contrac * with Henry Bickley for the Southern District, and with John L. Hill and R. Henry Smith for the Northern District, for the cleansing of the streets of said districts, and the removal of all dirt. garb-age, effai, ashes, dead anima's and other refuse mat-ter there rom, for five years, at a rate of charge to the city not exceeding ninety-two thousand dollars per annum, payable monthly in count portions, after said work is performed. Each of the said contracts shall be entered into with two or more good and sufficient sureties for its faithful fu filment (to be approved by Councils), and the contract shall particularly specify those streets, in the business portions of the city, which it shall be the duty of the said contractors to cleans twice in said of the said contractors to cleanse twice in each week, the work to be done at night, or between the bours of six o'clock P. M. and eight o'c'cck A M.; and all other paved streets, alleys, o'c'cck A M; and all other paved streets, alleys, courts, anes, gutters, and gutters under railway crossings, shall be counsed at least once in each week, and all ashes, parisage, dire, and other refuse matter removed therefrom, and the inlets to all public sewers to be at all times ik p clean and clear or all obstructions; and the execution of all said work shall be under the supervision of the Chief Inspector of Streets and the Joint Committee of Councils on cleansing the streets: Provided, that if, in the opinion of the Mayor, unon his own information, or upon that of the said Chief Inspector or Joint Committee, there shall be any failure on the part of the said contractors to perform all the requirements of the said contracts, the Mayor may, by written notice to the said contractor or contracts, forthwith and absolutely annul the said contract or contracts, information whereof shall be contract or contracts, information whereof shall be communicated to Councils at their next stated meeting: Provided also, That the contractors for each district at all give security in the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars for the faithful performance of their

Section 2. That all the payments to be made under the contracts to be entired into by virtue of this Ordinance, shall be payable in warrants, drawn by the May or upon the City Treasurer, in equal monthly instalments; and one-tenth of the amount of each of and monthly instalments shall be retained by the city, to be appropriated as hereinafter directed: Provided That when the sum so retained on each of the city of the treatment of the thousand dollars the city, to be appropriated as hereinatter directed:
Provided That when the sum so retained on each contract shall amount to five thousand dollars, the remaining payments may at the option of the Mayor, be paid in full as they shall thereafter become due.
Section 3. The Chief Inspector of Screets shall overlook and supervise the work of the contractors, and report any neglect on their part to the Mayor, and to the Committee on Street Cleansing, and notify the contractor or contractors of his or their neglect. It, after such report and notice, the contractors, or any of them, shall not immediately remedy the complaint, the Committee on Street Cleansing may direct the Chief Inspector of Streets to perform the work at the expense of the confinctor or contractors in default, the cost of performing the same to be paid out of the amount heretoloreauthorned to be retained, and the Mayor is hereby authorized to draw warrants for that purpose, on presentation of he bill's therefor by the Chief Inspector of Streets. Section 4.
