INTERESTING ITEMS.

HIGH SALARIES.-The salaries of the Lords of the Admiralty are set forth in a parliamentary paper just published. The Duke of Somerset re-ceives £4666 a year; Sir F. W. Grey, £1876 10s.; Rear-Admiral Eden, £1566 5s.; Rear-Admiral Fanshawe, £1566 5s.; Rear-Admiral Drummond, £1566 5s.; and Mr. Fenwick, M. P., £1000. Lord C. E. Paget gets £2482 10s., and Mr. Romain, £1537 as secretaries. Mr. Briggs, the chief clerk, gets a salary of £1000 a year, and altogether the salaries of the clerks amount to £21,302. In France the grand marshal of the palace, grand almoner, grand chamberlain, master of the horse, grand master of the hounds, and principal master of the ceremonies, receive 60,000 francs a year each. The Emperor's secretary receives 40,000 francs; the principal secretary 12,000 francs, and the police-inspector of the imperial residence 20,000 francs. The Secretaries of State and the President of the Council of State have each 100,000 france, and the principal secretaries to the ministers from 18.000 to 25,000 francs each. There are seven privy councillors having the rank of ministers, who are each paid 100,000 francs a year.

DARING FEAT .- The Montreal Gazette describes a very daring feat of one of the Grand Trunk engine drivers. Mr. T. Laughland, driver of Engine No. 73, was coming down the line on the 28th ult., with No. 7 freight train, when on cross ng round the curve, two miles west of Cornwall, he saw a drunken man sleeping on the track. He immediately whistled down the brakes, which the conductor and brakesman applied as quickly as possible; but the distance was so short, that it was impossible to pull up in time. Laughland immediately ran out on the cow-catcher, and as the locomotive came up he slooped forward and seized the man by the neck, and endeavored to pull him on to the cow-catcher, but being unable to do so, jumped off with the man, and succeeded in throwing him clear of the train. The whole train of seventeen cars passed the place before it could be stopped. On learning the facts the authorities ordered that two days' nay should be handed over to Laughland as a slight reward for his

THE BRITISH SOLDIER.-The Pall Mall Gazette says the intellectual condition of the British army appears to be of a much higher order than is commonly supposed, though it still falls far short of what might not unreasonably be considered attainable. According to returns just published, it is found that 63 67 per cent. of the men are able both to read and write, and 6 80 per cent, are of a superior education. Of the remaining 29:52 per cent., 16:55 can read but not write, and 12:07 can neither read nor write. 12:07 per cent, of soldiers, therefore, are unable either to read or write.

LOTTERY LUCK.-An Englishman living near Bath recently received a ticket for a Frankfort lottery, which he threw aside. The ticket subsequently got into the possession of the servants, four in number, who made up and remitted to the proper quarter the price of the ticket, fl.
