THE SOUTHERN RELIEF FAIR

Autograph Letters of Washington, John Adams, Lafayette, and Alexander Hamilton.

The great Southern Relief Fair, at Baltimore, or which preparations have so long been making by the ladies there, opened at the hall of the Maryland Institute, last Monday evening, under the most favorable auspices. The Baltimore Sun says:-

The scene presented was one not easily described. The immense hall, brilliantly illuminated by frunfreds of gas jets, and gayly occorated with national flags, with the various tables and stands adored with flowers and evergreens, displayed a sight not o len witnessed in a lietime, and was one that could only be appreciated by being seen. The crowd pre-sent comprised most respectable citizens of all classes and cr eds, radgions and politics.

Casses and or eds. reagions and points. Nearly seven thousand tickets were sold, whilst hundreds of persons were unable to get within hail-ing distance of the ticket office, and were compelled return to their homes without gaining admittance.

The Gazette of Tuesday has the following:-J. 

DUTIES, INCOMES, AND TRAINING OF THE GREAT JOCKEYS. From the Pall Mall Gazette, March 22, A squabble between the Marquis of Hastings and Grimshaw, the Jockey, has given the uninitiated an insight into the duties and earnings of the small men who ride for the great stakes of the English tur. Lord Hastings was Grimshaw's first master-i. c., when his lordship started a horse for a race, Grim-shaw was bound to lide the animal, being at hearty when his first master did not want him to ride for anybody else who would employ and pay him. For when his inst master did hot want him to ride for anybody else who would employ and pay him. For this service Lord Hastings gave Grunshaw a re-taining ice of ±600 a year, paying him besides 55 for each race won, and ±35 for each race lost, and his traveling expenses.
