BOARD OF SCHOOL CONTROLLERS .- The Controllers of Public Schools held a stated meet-

ing yesterday afternoon.
A communication was received from the Direct tors of the First Section, informing the Controllers that there are in that section \$28 children awaiting admission into the schools; that two of the school-houses are unfit for the purpose, and that Scott school will have to be soon vacated. Controllers are asked to request an appropriation from Conneils of \$30,000, to build two school-houses, of eight divisions each. The communication was referred to Councils. A communication was received from the Di-

rectors of the Seventeenth Section, notifying the Board of the passage of a resolution, in which it is declared that James McManus has not been a member of the Board of Directors of that section since the first of last January, and is not entitled to a seat in the Board of Controllers. The communication was laid on the table.
The Directors of the Twenty-sixth Section usked that measures be taken to have the Girard School House placed under their control.

A remonstrance was received from pupils of the Central High School against the removal of Professor Magnire, having, as they say, full confidence in his ability to discharge the full duties of his position, as he has hitherto done.

Mr. Hilles offered a resolution that the remonstrance be imd on the table as improper and disrespectful, and that the Committee on the School be directed to inform the boys of the fact, with a note of reprimand for their undue interference. Adopted, yeas 11, nays 8.

The Committee on Accounts reported their approval of bills to the amount of \$22,089 89, for which warrants were directed to be drawn. A proposed amendment to a by-law, to remove the restriction in respect to the age of pupils to be admitted into the Boys' and Girls' High Schools, was called up, and, after discussion, was postponed until the next meeting.

Mr. Taylor offered a resolution to the effect that Councils be requested to authorize the Controllers to use a portion of the million dollars obtained on the loan, for the building of school houses. Adopted.

A resolution was offered to pay certain bills of the Seventeenth Ward, which were thrown out at the last meeting of the Board. The resolution was laid on the table. Adjourned,

CORONER'S INQUEST .- The Coroner yesterday held an inquest on Letitis L. Lister, who died from the effects of chloroform, administered by W. W. Slack, dentist, in Federal street, below Sixth.

Slack testified that the deceased had called upon him for the purpose of having teeth extracted, and preferred inhaling chloroform to nitrous oxide gas; she said she had taken chloroform before, and was not a raid to take it again; he administered chloroform in the usual manner; the quantity was small; he had given twice as much on other occasions without any bad effect; after she had inhaled the chloroform, and as he was about to begin operations, he noticed slight spasmodic movements and change of countenance, and immediately used every effort to revive the patient, but without avail, Dr. Slack stated that he had been in the practice of administering chloroform, when called for, during seven years, and had assisted at its

administration five years, without accident.

Dr. Shapleigh testified that he had made a post morten examination of deceased. There vas no disease of any internal organ; brain heart, lungs, liver, etc., were sound; a slight congestion of the lungs and brouchial tubes was observable; there was nothing to conflict with the supposition that death resulted from the use of chloroform; death might have been caused by the chloroform administered. Dr. Shapleigh said that the best ansesthetic nitrous oxide; after that, ether, and then chloroform. The latter had been exclusively used in the army during the late war, and was perhaps almost as safe as any for general purposes. It is preferred in practice, for its potency, and because it does not stimulate. In proportion as anæsthetics stimulate, he thought were dangerous. Some people were peculiarly constituted, and might be more powerfully affected than others. He gave instances of ro-bust persons being powerfully affected by com-paratively harmless drugs. Fries, who exhibits two honorable discharges from the army, entered the restaurant in question, and, after a few words with the bartender, drew two pistols, one in erch hand, and fired three shots in rapid succession. Robinson.
Only one of the shots took effect, and this did not do se mortally. The ball entered at the base of the nose, passed downward, and emerged below the law. The wounded man sank instantly. The shooting was done so quickly that nobody had time to interere. The saloon is very respectably conducted, and the proprietor knew nothing of any difficulty in which his barkeeper was engaged. Alderman Dougherty happened to be taking his supper there at the time. He disarmed the holder of the pistols, and conducted him unresisting to the Station House, corner of Fifth and Chesnut streets. The wounded man was taken to his place of resi-The wounded man was taken to his place of residence, close in the vicinity, No. 531 Fowell street.
Fries made a singular statement when at the Station House. He claimed that Robinson had

seduced his sister; but at the same time admitted that she had a child four years old, of which Robinson was the father. He expressed but one regret-that he had not killed Robinson out According to his own statement, he has spent the last three days in a debauch. He has been absent in the army since the war began, and claims that it was only within a few days past that he knew of the rate that had befallen

A formal investigation of the case will proba-bly develop further particulars. It is said that the prisoner is one among other heirs to an ex-tensive estate in Germany, of which a partition will be made in the ensuing autumn. It is evident that alcoholic stimulus prompted the act. When arrested, Fries was still far from sober. He informed our reporter that some time ago he descrited from the army to shoot Robinson, but returned, unable to find him.
