## LEGAL INTELLIGENCE.

District Court No. 1—President Judge Sharswood.—Mechanics' Bank vs. Stephen sianagan. An action on two promisory notes drawn by the defendant to the order of the Insurance Company of the State of Virgima, in December, 1859, and by the Company indersed to the Bank of the Company morsed to the Bank of the Commonwealth of Richmond, Virgima, and by the bank indersee to plaintiffs.
