THE GREAT POPLAR DEMONSTRATION.

Opening of the Wood Pulp Works at Manayunk, and Speeches by the Wood Pulpers.



(Great cheering.) He claimed no particular merit in the discovery of the poplar, or in locating the worse in the beautiful city of Manayunk, except as poplar trees were there abundant and books schece, it seemed natural to harmonize the wants which nature had designed. (Cheers.)

Pulp Jenckes was here offered a piece of Toast, called "The Press of New York," by our Mayor, which was accepted by Pulp Tilton, of the New York Independent. This pulp, it would seem, is in a yet very pulpy state. 
