THE SUEZ ROUTE TO INDIA .- It is reported in Paris that a company is about to be formed for establishing a direct line of communication be tween India and France and England, by way of the Isthmus of Suez and Marseilles. A new railway is to be constructed for this purpose in a direct line from Marseilles to Calais, by which nearly two hundred miles will be saved.

BATH Houses .- Bostonians are preparing for a general immersion all around through the coming season. The City Fathers have just appropriated \$10,000 for city baths, and men, women, and children are expected to betake themselves forthwith to the aqueous element, and there remain until the work of purification is complete.

SHABBY RECRUITS FOR THE POPE.-The committee which has been formed in Holland and Belgium for the enlistment of volunteers for the Pope has sent one thousand three hundred and fifty recruits to Rome, and has promised to send more. The Papal Government, however, is not much pleased with its new defenders, most of whom have deserted after receiving their bounty

RUSH FOR WESTERN LAND .- A wonderful rush for land for actual settlement is now taking place. Reports received at the General Land Office show that over 49,700 acres were entered at the District Land Office of Booneville, Mo., the greater portion for homestead actual settlement, a part cash sales, amounting to \$10.462, and the residue bounty land locations. At La Crosse office, Wisconsin, 7436 acres were taken up, and at Topeka. Kansas, 5000 acres were taken up, making in all 65,162 acres.

OYSTERS IN OLD SALT MARSHES, -- An English paper says that an experiment in the cultivation of oysters in the old salt marshes near Lyming ton, Hants, is successful. Many thousands of oysters taken from various grounds are laid down, and some time hence means will be taken to secure the spawn. Old oyster shells are for this purpose strung on cords stretched across the ponds near the surface; to these the rising generation will dutifully adhere, if all be pro-

THE PRUSSIAN PROPLY.—Thirty members of the Liberal party in Prussia, mostly deputies, have opened a subscription for the benest of sufferers in the constitutional struggle between crown and parliament. The proceeds are chiefly intended to support Liberals deposed from office, and to assist persecuted newspaper editors. The anniversary of the 18th of March, 1848, was this year kept by many who had long wished to bury in oblivion the day when Berlin erected barricades against its King, and for twelve hours fought its own Prussian army. The cemetery in the Friedrichs-Hain, where those who fell were nierred, was crowded all day.
