Great Activity at the Navy Yards. A SQUADRON ORDERED TO THE COART OF MAINE— THE PLEET TO READEZVOUS AT RASTPORT—A RE-SERVE FORCE TO BE HELD READY AT THE BROOK-

Never since the first year of the war has there been so much activity manifested at the different navy yards as at the present time, there being at the six naval stations of New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Portsmouth, Baltimore, and Washington, over forty vessels fitting out for service. About half of the number are intended for service on our Bastern coast and for the formation of the contemplated Bouth Pacific and Indian Ocean squadrous, but what use can be found for the residue in time of peace is a mystery which can only be solved by the hypothesis that the Government expects trouble to grow out of the Fenian and fishery complications. Whether this be the true solution of the matter or not, we will not venture to say, but one thing appears certain, if we should unfortunately become involved in a war with England, we will not be found unprepared. It has been estimated that, if necessary, the Navy Department could place, within a month, a fleet of fifty vessels, fully armed and squipped, at the disposal of the Government. This is exclusive of iron-clacs, of which there are about sixty laid up in ordinary at League Island and other places. These vessels could be get ready for sea in a very short time as the majority of them require no repair whatever, but only want stores and men to be fit for immediate service. In addition to all this, there are the vessels composing the Atlantic, Gulf, and West India squadrons, iron each of which a number of gunboat, could be drawn. It will be seen by the above facts that we are july prepared for any difficulty which may arise; and though we hope there may be no occasion to make use of our naval power, it is a source of gratification to know that we are ready for anything that may occur.
