The members, finally, by paying attention to their P's and Q's, got an adjournment in time to see the Freedmen's Parade.




MAYOR M'MICHAEL'S NEW STREET CLEANING MA CHINES.

From Our Washington Correspondent. The colored procession to-day was the strongest turn out in the way of civic parades ever witnessed in Washington. The number of colored people in line and out of line and crossing the line was over 20,000. General Grant gave the colored battery an order to fire a hundred guns. The commanding officer reported that they only had six, and did not know where to get the balance to make up the number. The General sent word back to divide the 100 rounds among the six guns; the colored procession halted while the officers went into a calculation as to how often each gun had to be fired, when they discovered that each one would have to be fired sixteen and two-third times.

They then commenced firing and got through the sixteen without difficulty, but to get the twothirds of a round out of each gun somewhat bothered the engineers, until they concluded to load the guns with a two-third charge, when everything went off pleasantly, including the guns.
