THE NEW LEDGER BUILDINGS .- Yesterday, at 12 o'clock, the bids for the extensions to the new Ledger Buildings, at the south west corthe new Ledger Buildings, at the south west corner of Chesnut and Sixth streets, were opened at the Butler House, on Sixth street, below Chesnut, in presence of the several bidders. There were five proposals, as follows:—Balderston & Albertson, \$222,000; D. Cramer & Son, \$232,000—each to complete the building in eight months; John Ketchum, \$220,204-36, to do the work in eight months: John Crump, \$182,000, the building to be finished within nine months; and \$122,000 is completed within six months. and \$192,000 is completed within six months; R. A. Dobbins, \$185,150, with a deduction for the materials in the old buildings on Sixth street and in the rear, the entire buildings to be completed in eight months from May 1. These bids lo not include the brown-stone front, about 100 feet on Sixth street, which has been contracted for by Struthers & Son, at about \$20,000. The contract will probably be closed to-day, and the work will be commenced at once.

AN ENORMOUS FOSSIL .- A recent issue of the Montana Register has an account of an important discovery made in that section. It says:-"The evidence adduced two weeks ago as to the existence, at some far-off period of the past, of an antediluvian beast of monstrous proportions, by the discrety of a molar or jaw-tooth in the claim of 1 fales, in Last Chance Gulch, opposite the end of Broad street, has received further confirmation by the discovery of an ivory tusk, in a somewhat decomposed state, about 15 feet in length. At the point of discovery it meafeet in length. At the point of discovery it measures 19 inches, and in a distance of six inches it increases to 22½ inches, and in a distance of 46 inches it increases to 27½ inches in circumference. A hasty examination by Mr. Rumley, the assayer, shows its principal constituent part to be phosphate of lime; its surface, fracture, and herve and vein lines are those of ivory. This tusk, which must have belonged to the father of all elephants, was found about twenty-five feet further up the guich than where the molar lay, and some four feet from the bed rock, and seventeen feet from the surface of the ground."
