James Glennon, tae Wife Murderer, Hanged-His Confession, and Explana-

iton of the Crime. The extreme penalty of the law was yesterday executed upon James Glennon at Elizabeth N. J. in which town, exactly a year since, he mordered his wite. The facts in connection with the crime are briefly the c:-Glennon was employed upon the works of the Camden and Amboy Rairoad Conpany, and bore an excel-lent christer for general sterdiness and souriety. His wite, however, by whom he had two children, was an intemperate woman, and generally neglectful of her nome and her hus-band, and frequently cruel to her children.

Glennon remonstrated with her frequently but to no pu pose, and at length her passion for drink and her neglect of her home duties became so great that he was obliged to caution the storekeepers in the neighborhood against supplying her with any kind of inicidating liquor, with or without payment. This course appears to have exasperated her, and to have led her to atmost starve her children, and on the 20th of April, 1865, the miseries of his housenold were brought to a climax. On the moraing of that day Glennon went home rather carlier than usual to dinner, and found that his whe had managed to purchase a quart of rum from a grocery store in the neighbo.no.d, and had become quite intoxicated. When he eitered the room she was lying, according to his own confession, across the children's cradie, with her beck towards him. He suddenly became very violent, exclaimed "D-n you!" to his wife, and struck her a blow on the back o, the head which felled her to the ground.

He then rushed from the house in a state of frenzy, but returned in a few minutes and lifted frenzy, but returned in a few minutes and lifted his wile from the floor by the head. He asserts that he struck her only cnce, and that it was from the effects of that one blow she died. Some neighbors, being arouted by the noise in Glernon's house, notified the police, who found, on examining the body of Mis. Glennon, that she was quite dead, and that there were merks as of throttling upon her throst. These marks the husband asserted were unorbhis wife's throat the husband asserted were upon his wife's throat on the evening previoes to the murder, but he

offs red no explanation of their cause. Glennon was tried at the special term, in Elizabeth, before Judge Haines, on the 19th of ebruary lest, was found guilty of marder in the first degree, and sentenced to be hung by the neck on the anniverse y of the day on which he committed the crime. Since his trial he has behaved with great gentleness and kindness to all these with whom he has been a sociated in prison; and he hes always persistently denied that the killing of h's wile was either premeditated or intentional; he attribut dit to an un-lucky blow, dealt in a moment of almost pardonable passion. To the last be had strong hopes of a reprieve, but the untiring exertions of many friends were fuile-even to prolong his life for a rew days more. His jeilors say that until the night before the day for which the execution was fixed, he lived, slept, and taked as usual; but that on that night he could not sleep at all. At two o'clock yesterday morning he lay down for a short time on the bed, but he could nei-ther sleep nor be still; he was obliged to get up and walk about his little cell.

Early in the day ne was visited by his father and uncle, the former living where his son was born, in brooklyn, and they stayed with him au hour or two, attempting to reconcile him to his fate. Later in the day his niece, who cried bitterly throughout her interview with him, visited the convict, who also shed many tears in parting with her. He comforted her, however, by saying that it was better he should die then, as he was prepared, and that he should die as he had lived, a staunch Roman Gatholic. Through-out the morning he smoked a great deal, and after his visitors had left he was able to speak quite coolly about the disposal of his body. He then took leave personally of all his fellow-pri-soners, who each shook him by the hand and bade him keep up his spirits. He was imme-diately after closeted with his spiritual adviser, to whom he repeated the substance of what we have stated with regard to his crime At 12; o'clock the pisoner was led out by the Sheriff to the place of erecut on, within the procincts of the jail. As he appeared, with the fatal noose around his throat, those who had managed to gain admission to the prison thronged up to the scaffold in silcnce. The Dep 1.v Sheriff (Mr. A. A. Ward) having read the war ant, which specified that the execution should take place between the hours of 10 and 2, asked the plasoner if he had anything to say. Clennon then said:-

A PREUMATO-ELECTRIC ORGAN,-At Salon, a A FARCHAROMETERING ONDER there is phen-hitle town in Provence. France, there is phen-mato-electric organ. The electric fluid has no influence either on the intensity, note, or pitch of the sound of the instrument. It only replaces a system of complicated levers by one of inau-lated wires instantaneous in their action. The current proceeding from the electric battery is conducted by metallic wires under the keys, by the action of which it is placed in communication with the valves of the organ,
